



It is with great sadness but a sigh of relief that we can confirm the worst kept secret in Bawdeswell...namely that we have sold The Bawdeswell Store to Martin McColls; the largest Independent Retail Chain in Britain.

They approached us about this time last year and my first reaction was "Forget it; I'm going out in a box!" Quick and painless for me but hardly fair on Shirl - trapped until I croak! So when I subsequently suffered a stroke (divine intervention?) and everyone talked of enjoying life - not working all the time, it suddenly seemed easier to go with the offer - so we could enjoy some quality time together after 40 years of marriage.

The deal has not been without its hiccups and as everyone knows moving house is fraught with minor setbacks: imagine selling a business too! The existing staff were promised continued employment but a few could not take the uncertainty and left anyway; our apologies for any slippage of service in the last few weeks. Although it has to be said that the vast majority of our staff have largely coped with a lot of changes, and ensured that our customers have still enjoyed their shopping experience.

Both Shirl and I feel sorry to leave - it's been nearly 20 years of hard but mostly enjoyable work which has been all consuming of our life. Unfortunately the strain of never ending regulation and directives takes a heavy toll. Most small businesses struggle to survive when faced with compulsory legislation and fierce competitors.

Our thanks to the Parish, District and County Councils who have been very supportive and Norfolk Constabulary, who have given excellent service.

A huge thank you to our customers and friends, the residents of Bawdeswell and Foxley and surrounding villages whose support has ensured the survival of a shop on this site. Despite the ensuing problems of deliveries and parking, their reward is in enhanced property values. It was not an easy village to find when we first came here but Bawdeswell is now a sought-after village for house hunting and is signposted from Kings Lynn and the A47. (Not single handedly down to us; the Garden Centre / Floranova and all the other businesses in the village have more than played their part.)

Lastly, my thanks to my family for everything over the years and especially Shirl, Fel and Dave who have worked extremely hard to keep things going for the last few months.

On the afternoon of Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> March we had Mr. Derek Edwards give us a talk with slides on 'Roman Norfolk from the Air'. Mr. Edwards is a qualified archaeologist who specializes in searching for Roman sites by photographing the land from the air looking for signs of ancient structures and roads.

This at first glance would seem to be a pretty 'dry' subject; but with Mr. Edward's enthusiastic and extremely learned guidance we were very quickly enthralled by the revelations of the photographs. I think, first of all, how amazed we all were by the sheer amount of Roman sites that are around us here in Norfolk. Farmers all over the county are ploughing and sewing just a few feet over the remaining foundations of forts, villas, temples, habitations of all sorts, and of course the ubiquitous Roman Road. One particular photograph, taken at high altitude, showed most of Norfolk, and there, bisecting the county, going as straight as a die, heading for the Wash, was the original Peddar's Way. We were quite awe-struck. We were looking at our roots.



For our meeting in March we had read The Age of Innocence by Edith Wharton.

The novel is set in 1870s New York but was written in 1919 just after the First World War. Edith Wharton was in France all through the war and concentrated her energies on war work. When she took up her pen again she reverted to the country of her birth and this previous age (post the American Civil War), but was it an age of innocence?

At one level the book is a romance that is tested/questioned by the arrival of an exotic third party, quite a basic story line. Newland Archer and his finance May are from New York establishment families and are very much constrained by the mores of that society. When May's cousin the Countess Olenska arrives from Europe after leaving her husband, she and Newland develop deep feelings for each other. Newland is a reader and a thinker and her circumstances lead him to question his society and particularly the position of women. He questions the double standards existing - the freedoms that married men enjoy and the constraints placed on women.

Both he and May have strong moral characters and for all her innocence May is aware of the attraction, although this knowledge is never spoken. There were rare moments when May's depth of understanding was shown and these heartened Newland. On one of these occasions she offered him his freedom but once they were engaged she fought for her man, Newland Archer. May wins an archery competition – she aims and achieves the bull's eye – so there is no doubt that she will also win her "Archer" fiancé. They are married and Madam Olenska returns to Europe.

The book fast forwards 25 years or so after that by which time May is dead and Newland and his son travel to Paris together. Newland is given the chance to see Elena Olenska but both he and she chose not to re-meet.

At a certain time in their lives they had been at a cross roads but had taken the honourable path, they had chosen to be hurt themselves rather than to hurt May. However, 25 years on perhaps they realised that as strongly as they had been drawn to each other, actually living a life together would not have worked.

Most members really enjoyed reading this novel, it was agreed that there are some wonderful descriptive passages. Some found it a little slow, there is not much action but there is plenty going on in the hearts, minds and souls of the 3 main characters. It was a reading experience to be savoured.

The Book Club meets in the Workhouse on the first Thursday of every month and welcomes new members. We mostly obtain books from the library so there is not the expense of buying new books each month. During March we are reading <u>Amsterdam</u> by Ian McEwan. This will be discussed at our next meeting on 5<sup>th</sup> April. During April we will be reading <u>Half of a Yellow Sun</u> by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie.

Outline planning Permission received for Mr Davis - erection of dwelling & garage at Cherry Tree Cottage

Planning planning permission was received for Mr Davis - sub division of Cherry Tree Cottage into 2.

The Appeal by Mrs Louden had been dismissed by the Planning Inspectorate.

Permission refused for Mesdames Bartrum and Turner re erection of dwelling.

Planning permissions ought by Mr & Mrs Rushbrook - Glebe House for conservatory, car port and extra windows. No objections from PC.

Renewal of planning permission was sought by Mr Greentree- storage of 17 caravans. Query from PC regarding "Office Units" marked on the new plan- on the old applications it was "Storage units".

Retrospective planning permission sought by Mr Kennett , Church Farm House for conversion of barn to art studio

Outline Planning Permission sought by Mr Hunt re demolishing of the Natterjack and building of 4 single storey dwellings on site. (This had been reported in Thursday's EDP but only just received by clerk so it was not on the published agenda.)

There was quite a protracted discussion in Open Forum regarding the plans for the Natterjack. Mr Hunt put forward his views and several parishioners put forwards theirs.)

Village Matters: Councillor Harvey reported the breaking in the church of a stained

glass window by a group of disaffected young people. The police were informed.

Councillor Westfield produced excellent photographic evidence of different sites in the village that were an eyesore.

Councillor Waller reported that the Dog Warden did not need an incriminating photograph before he was able to act. Dog owners are reminded that it is mandatory to clear up after their pets within a 40mph zone.

It was once again re iterated that the Paper Bank in the Village is not only helping recycling but earning money for use by the Village Hall Committee. All parishioners are urged to put their newspapers etc into the Bank.

All Foxley residents over the age of 18 were encouraged to think about becoming Parish Councillors in the next term which begins with Parish Elections on 3 May 2007. Contact the Parish Clerk on 01362668302 for more details.

Date of next meeting: Tuesday 8 May, 7.30pm in Village Hall ANNUAL PARISH MEETING followed by ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, followed by 1st Parish Council Meeting of the year. (p.s. these are not usually lengthy affairs).

An extra ordinary meeting of the Parish Council was held on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> March at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. The subject for discussion was Planning Application 3PL/2006/1923: Demolition of the public house The Natterjack, and redevelopment for residential purposes i.e. 4 single storey dwellings.

The reason for calling the meeting was that it was necessary to return to Breckland Council the Parish Council's agreement or disagreement before 8<sup>th</sup> March 2007, and notice had not been previously given of this application.

Representing the Parish Council was a quorum consisting of the Chairman, Mr. J Harvey supported by Mrs. R. Waller and Mr. N. Mears. The meeting was attended by some fifty people or so: roughly a fifth of the adult population of the village.

The Chairman took great pains to point out the pros and cons of this matter: the effect on the village of the closure of The Natterjack through lack of support, and at the present moment being unable to attract a buyer, the result would then be a boarded-up building; or voting for the planning permission for four new dwellings on the site. After letters expressing opinions on this matter from non-attending residents were read out, the discussion was thrown open to the floor. The debate that followed was extremely lively with both the pros and cons being enthusiastically, and sometimes vociferously, expressed. In the true manner of dialectics a third option did emerge: that it would be preferable that a buyer might be found who could make a success of the pub.

Finally, the floor was asked to vote on whether planning permission should be granted to build four dwellings on the site of The Natterjack. The outcome was: For: 17 votes. Against: 27 votes. Abstentions:7. There were also 7 votes against by letter and e.mail

Would you like to be a Bawdeswell Parish Councillor



The Parish Council is a vital part of our community. They are responsible for many issues affecting the village and especially for setting the Parish Precept which is paid with your Council Tax bill. For Bawdeswell this will equate to an average of a bit less than 25p per week for each member of our village community in 2007/8 and pays the clerk's salary, insurance premium, maintenance of the playing field and Village Hall, maintenance of the churchyard, Village Handyman's wages and materials and a number of other items including some support for this magazine.

Planning issues have been at the forefront of recent meetings with Folland Court and Bawdeswell Store. These Parish Council meetings have been well attended and villagers have been able to express their opinions. However, decisions made by the Parish Council have to reflect the needs of the whole village and may not necessarilly be agreed with by everyone. If you would like to be part of the decision making process then you might like to consider becoming a Parish Councillor.

On Thursday May 3rd 2007 all seven places on Bawdeswell Parish Council are up for election. Some current members of the council are standing down so there will be vacancies. If seven or less nominations are received for Parish Councillors then there will no election and those nominated will automatically become councillors. If there are less than seven Councillors then others may be co-opted on to the council to make up the number required.

At the date of publication 7 nomination packs have been handed out – BUT WHAT HAS HAPPENED TO YOU LADIES? We need a female perspective on the Parish Council!!

The Parish Council normally meets at 7.45pm in the Village Hall on the first Monday of each month excluding January and August when the council is in recess. Following the May 3<sup>rd</sup> election the next meeting has been arranged for Monday 14<sup>th</sup> May at 7.15pm. This is to allow time for the results of the election to be posted. This meeting will comprise of (i) Annual Parish Meeting, (ii) Parish Council Annual Meeting and (iii) May Parish Council Meeting.

### Running for office - Parish Councils

Bawdeswell needs 7 councillors and Foxley need 5. If you would like to be a candidate the process is quite simple. You must obtain a 'Nomination Pack' either from your Parish Clerk (Bawdeswell 688234, Foxley 668302) or from Breckland Council. The nomination form requires a proposer and seconder who must both be on the electoral roll for the parish. The consent form is for you to agree to the nomination and to state how you are eligible to stand for council. Forms must be submitted to Breckland Council Offices no later than noon on Wednesday 4th April.

In order to be a parish councillor you must be aged 18 years or over and be a Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of an EU member state and you must qualify to be a parish councillor for your parish in one or more of the following ways:

- be a local government elector in the parish (ie on the electoral roll)
- · have owned or rented land within the parish for the last twelve months
- have lived in the parish or within 4.8 kilometres (3 miles) of it (of the Parish Boundary) for the last twelve months
- · have worked in the parish for the last twelve months

You cannot stand as a candidate if you are disqualified from being elected by reason of any disqualification set out in section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972.

Specifically, a person cannot be a candidate if:

- they are employed by the local authority or hold paid office under the authority (including joint boards or committees), or
- they are the subject of a Bankruptcy Restriction order in England or Wales, have been adjudged Bankrupt in Northern Ireland, or had their estate sequestrated in Scotland, or
- they have been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of three months or more Including a suspended sentence) without the option of a fine during the five years before election day (i.e. since 4<sup>th</sup> May 2002), or
- they have been disqualified under Part III of RPA 1983 (this relates to donations and other offences as well) or under the Audit Commission Act.

Full details of requirements for eligibility and disqualifications are given in the Nomination Pack.

If you are nominated as a candidate for Bawdeswell or Foxley Parish Council and there are sufficient candidates to require an election in your parish you will be given the opportunity to have a paragraph (free of charge) in the next Reeve's Tale to tell the electorate about yourself.

# enhancing our community

At the meeting on 10 March the Steering Group welcomed Paul Digby from Bawdeswell Bowls Club. The current status of the club, how it fits into the project and the possibility of a youth section were discussed.

Alex Kirby reported on the successful first meeting of the Building and Access Sub Group. A Development Functionality Chart has been produced and was refined at the meeting following discussion. The target is to have a brief prepared for the Architect by the end of March and some detailed plans produced by June, following discussions with Breckland re planning permission issues in between.

Graham Swain is taking the Children's Play area sub-group forward and is talking to appropriate people at Breckland Council. He is working hard to have a funding application ready by May. Requirements for a tennis court are being investigated.

The Activities sub-group is being formed and their first meeting is to be arranged for early April so that they can report back to the Steering Group at the next meeting.

Additional members are being sought for the Plaving Field sub-group whose first priority will be arranging the proper draining of the field. A survey of the field is being carried out and quotations are to be obtained.

Committee members are to liaise with the Heath Trustees before the Bawdeswell Heath sub-group progresses further.

Funding options are being investigated but timescales are tight. The National Lottery 'Big Fund', The Sports Council, Sports England East and Defra are current funding options. More local fundraising is required.

The secretary has written to all those who offered help on the survey form and is starting to get some positive replies. She has also written to The Friends of Bawdeswell School and spoken to the teacher responsible for PE at the school about help for children's sport and outdoor activities.

The next meeting of the Steering Group is on Saturday 21st April at 10am in the Village Hall. ALL villagers are welcome to attend.



Dear Everybody, hello again.

The wind that blew over the tree in my last month's letter also blew out a window in Elsing Church and brought down some branches into the churchyard. But even out of damage, good can come.

This Easter Day at 7.15 am (strictly for early risers) we shall light a bonfire in Elsing Churchyard made from some of the fallen tree limbs. Do come if you would like, it will be part of a short-ish vigil service. From as early as the second century, Christians lit fires at Easter, a new fire to show the new energy in the resurrection, so we'll continue that tradition. Fire features in other religious traditions too.

We have to be careful of fire, and we teach children that it can be dangerous. But fire is also one of the most important things in our lives; heat for cooking, keeping warm, making machines move, the sun that is essential for life. And we also have words about fire in our emotions that are positive: "aglow", "ardent", "warm-hearted".

There are lots of ideas in the one idea of the new fire. First, as we get rid of things in our lives that are dead or damaged, we are rewarded with light and warmth. Second, those who have died will move on, Christians pray, into a place of light and warmth. Third, even in the dark there is always the possibility of light. Fourth, a new fire is a beginning.

Because the date of Easter is governed by the moon, unlike Christmas which is a sundate, and the days are already brighter, sometimes it seems to lose its radiance by comparison (and the Elsing bonfire will be after dawn). And you may find this same feeling in your life. Sometimes a most important thing is happening, but because it is not in contrast to its surroundings, it is not as obvious. The change of direction when we hit rock bottom can be dramatic, but sometimes we can be happy and change significantly, without it showing so much.
