

Dear Editor

I have just found out that the Parish Council are considering allowing a mobile phone mast to be erected in our village. As a Health Kinesiology practitioner I spend a lot of my time dealing with many illnesses and problems caused to both adults and children by external electromagnetic sources. Electromagnetic Fields in the environment typically come from outdoor power lines, mobile phones and masts, electric pylons, house wiring, electrical appliances, electrical heating systems, fans, watches and clocks, in fact anything that plugs in and most things with batteries. 

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL-EXTRACTS FROM MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 5th FEBRUARY 2007 AT

7.45pm IN THE VILLAGE HALL

PRESENT: Councillor's Hind, Mallen, Lilwall, Cockburn, Swain and Wallace 35 parishioners

MINUTES OF LAST MEETING; Agreed and signed

Mr. Carl Beane was co-opted onto the PC.

PLANNING:

-Bawdeswell Stores, The Street – change of use of 4 bedroom house to 3 No.1 bed houses, replace derelict sheds with extension to retail. Mr. Andrew Farquarson of Martin McColls Ltd. attended the meeting to answer any questions. It came across quite forcibly from some of the Parishioners present that there were many objections/concerns relating to the traffic in The Street, shop deliveries, loading and unloading of lorries in the vicinity and cars being parked along the Old Reepham Road. Three new parking spaces have been made available for houses plus 2/3 for the new Manager and assistants at the back of the shop. Mr. Farquarson promised to let us know exactly how many new parking spaces can be included plus Highways comments.

-Folland Court – PP was refused in December for demolition of sheltered housing and construction of 8 dwellings for rental and erection of PO. Laura Handford (Flagship Housing Business Development Manager) and Peter Wells PW architect attended the meeting to find out how Parishioners would like to see site developed. Parishioners would like more bungalows for the older people in the village but this might not be cost effective or viable . PW are to improve the pathway through the site. Peter Wells to produce new plans. Laura promised to go away and let PC have details of exact mix of houses in Bawdeswell and occupancy – Highways comments – cost of building bungalows against original proposed housing. Matter pending new plans/costs.

If there are less than 7 Councillors then others may be co-opted on to the council to make up the number required. If there are less than 4 then we lose the Parish Council!!!!!

Running for office

In order to be a parish councillor you must be aged 21 years or over and be a Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of an EU member state and you must qualify to be a parish councillor for your parish in one or more of the following ways:

- be a local government elector in the parish (i.e. on the electoral roll)
- · have owned or rented land within the parish for the last twelve months
- have lived in the parish or within 4.8 kilometres (3 miles) of it (of the Parish Boundary) for the last twelve months
- have worked in the parish for the last twelve months

You cannot stand as a candidate if you are disqualified from being elected by reason of any disqualification set out in section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972. To find out more about becoming a candidate visit the electoral commissions website at www.electoralcommission.org.uk

Bawdeswell Village Hall

Bawdeswell Village hall is available for hire by both parishioners and non residents.

At present the hall is available most weekdays during the day and alternate Wednesday evenings. There are lots of Saturdays and Sundays still free. You can also hire tables and chairs for you own events. The Parish Council meet here at 7.45pm on the first Monday of the month except January & August. Where there is a Bank Holiday the meeting is a week later.



All our income is being spent on running and improving the hall. In 2006 we installed new wall cupboards and replacement cupboard doors in the kitchen, replaced the cooker and microwave oven, installed baby change facilities and purchased high chairs. An outside power supply was installed to facilitate activities on the playing field such as the annual village fete and the use of bouncy castles etc for children's parties. Most of the emergency lighting units were replaced and the hall and equipment electrically tested. A 'Paintathon' was also held to redecorate. In 2007 we plan to make further improvements including making the side door the main entrance to overcome wind problems with the front door, replacement of the kitchen worktops and counter and provision of safe access to the storage area above the toilet block. We are also looking at the provision of proper disabled parking and access as well as improving the access road and car park area.

Regrettably, for the first time in several years, we have had to slightly raise the hourly hire charge for 2007 as we have had very significant increases in our utility bills, especially electricity charges. The new rates are shown below and you will see that we have introduced a discount on the hourly rate for parishioners as well as for longer hires. Other discounts are available to regular users.


Bawdeswell community groups can also use the hall on weekdays between 9am and 4pm for a nominal charge only.

Lorna Doone by R.D. Blackmore Although some book club members, in their youth, had read an abridged version of Lorna Doone none of us had read the full version before. It is not a quick read so we gave ourselves two months, November and December, to read it. The members'verdict was that it is certainly a classic worth reading.

Written in 1869 the setting for the story is in the 17th century and so the novel can be classed as a Victorian historical romance. The rustic hero, Exmoor farmer John Ridd, describes how he carried off and married a beautiful daughter of the aristocracy. The novel opens with John's reminiscences of early schooldays and essentially finishes with his marriage to Lorna. During this time, by honesty and hard work, John rises to economic prosperity and the title of 'Sir John Ridd'. Whilst you can find yourself admiring John's strength, heroism and commitment to his family it is difficult to feel the same warmth towards Lorna's character. She is portrayed as a fragile beauty with 'no notion of work' and although you can sympathise with her abduction when a child, by the Doone's, it is easier to relate to the other young female characters: John's sisters - 'housekeeping Annie' and 'book-reading Lizzie' - and his capable cousin Ruth.

We all found the love plot rather sentimental but Lorna Doone is far more than just a romantic novel. By setting the novel during the reign of Charles II, Blackmore is able to include the economic, political and religious problems of the time and dramatise events such as the Monmouth rebellion. However, the aspect of the book that sets it apart from other books is the use of language. There were some one-liners that were quite amusing such as the description of Judge Jeffrey who was elevated to the first man in the kingdom for 'his kindness in hanging five hundred people, without the mere grief of trail' and we all enjoyed the poetic prose and dialect that Blackmore uses to paint a nostalgic picture of rural England. To illustrate this here is a sentence from my favourite passage in the book.

'To awake as the summer sun came slanting over the hill-tops, with hope on every beam adance to the laughter of the morning; to see the leaves across the window ruffling on the fresh new air, and the tendrils of the powdery vine turning from their beaded sleep'. If only I could wake up with such thoughts!

Therese Racquin by Emile Zola January's choice was Therese Racquin by the French author Emile Zola. A tale of adultery, murder and madness, the novel caused a scandal when it was published in 1867. Therese leads a boring life trapped in a loveless marriage to her sickly cousin Camille and running a dreary haberdashery shop, in a dingy Paris backstreet, with her aunt. Therese's life changes dramatically when Camille brings home Laurent, a fellow clerk from the Orleans Railway Company. Therese and Laurent embark on a turbulent affair and their desire to meet freely compels them to commit a crime which will haut them for the rest of their lives.

Zola has a unique matter-of-fact style and the novel reads like a documentary on human animal behaviour at its worst. There is no love or compassion between the main characters, their only concern is to satisfy their own needs. The book club members found the book interesting and well-written and were pleased they had been introduced to Zola's work. However, nobody could say they actually enjoyed the story and feelings were mixed about whether they would read any more Zola novels.

Are you an older person looking to broaden your social circle and explore new horizons? Perhaps you are a carer who would like to have a friendly ear there for you occasionally, or maybe you have a housebound elderly relative who would like to have more social interaction.

The Teleclub is a new social club and contacts service whose aim is to provide emotional support, mental stimulation, social contact, fun and entertainment for the over 65s.

It is mainly a telephony service that, for £10 a quarter offers:

A local rate number that members can call to talk to our friendly staff throughout the day.

Up to three weekly calls from the Teleclub to its members.

Telephone 'coffee mornings' where groups of members can take part in chaired discussions, play games, hold quizzes and socialise.

A contacts service - members provide us with details of their interests, and these are cross-referenced to find possible new friends for them in their area.

Signposting information - members can be pointed in the direction of various other services available to them that they may not usually be aware of.

Members also receive a quarterly newsletter containing MENSA puzzles, quizzes, a letters page, a pen pals page, a book club and much more that we encourage them to contribute to. They also receive birthday cards, Christmas cards and the occasional postcard from the club.

In the future the Teleclub will be developing a website with forums for members to hold discussions about any topic they choose, and to facilitate this we are planning to offer a degree of introductory IT training.

The Teleclub is just one of a series of new initiatives set up by the Partnership For Older Peoples Projects 'At Home, Not Alone' scheme, which is dedicated to improving the quality of older peoples lives through a raft of innovative new services. These services include a home shopping service, a falls advice service, a home security service and a 24-hour unplanned need service.



The Christian women of Paraguay invite you to join them in prayer on the theme of "United under God's Tent".


Our Benefice Service will be held at St Margaret's Lyng at 2 00 pm, followed by tea/coffee and biscuits.

There is a large gap between the rich and the poor, the main cause of which is unequal distribution of land. 10% of the population owns 66% of the countryside. 1 in 4 Paraguayans is poor and the poorest 40% do not have enough to eat.

Paraguayan women can earn an income by selling their many and varied craft items, the most well-known of these being the 'nanduti' (spider web lace). Although many Paraguayan women are hard-working and ambitious, most remain care-givers and raise a family single-handedly.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

As I sit at my desk, I look out at a hole in the sky-line where there was once a tree. The man from Breckland Conservation had told me that I couldn't cut the tree down because the ivy in which it was covered was good protection for the birds.

But it was the ivy that did it in. At one point in the recent gales I was looking at it and thought: "That tree is bending a lot." Then: "How is that tree going to get upright again?" Then: "Oh, it's not going to" as slowly and gracefully it lowered itself to the ground.

Some actions which we do with the best intentions have consequences we don't intend or desire. I expect that there are many times when you were trying to do the right thing, and it was taken wrongly. The tree was a good idea in one way, but the windage from the ivy was too much for it.

And, like the majority of fallen trees, once an action has been done, we cannot recall it, we cannot take it back. There are moments that we wish we could have over again. And that's not just from unintended consequences, but also because we've been inattentive, careless or unkind. Trouble is, life is not a computer game, and although we have many chances, we can't wind back time and try again. Senior politicians can't undo what they did at fifteen. I think that the number of TV programmes about time-travel are linked to this feeling of "if only". Living in the 'now' can be hard.

Saying sorry and forgiveness happen when we know that something cannot be taken back. We can't change the past. But we can work on changing ourselves, so that next time, we act differently. In Lent, Christians think of how they can, with God's help, become people who react more responsibly and lovingly. But for all of us, whatever our faith, our past doesn't stop us changing for the better.
