# Foxley Parish Council Meeting

Précis of meeting on Tuesday 11 September 2007 in the Village Hall. **Present:** Mr Harvey, Mr Barrett and Mrs Nightingale(Pritchard), Mrs Floering Blackman, 12 parishioners and the clerk. Mr Mears and Mr Hatch and the District Councillor had sent apologies.

**Minutes** of the last meeting on 11 July 2007 were approved and signed. The Chairman introduced Angie Powles our local Police Community Support Officer who gave a resume of the work of the new Safe Neighbourhood Teams. Once all PCSOs had been trained and were in post, Norfolk would be fully covered by a network of cells comprising Police Officers and PCSOs. The Community Officer could act as eyes and ears on each patch and deal with low key neighbourhood disputes. They would also raise public awareness of the need to report every incident to the central station at Wymondham where it is logged so that coherent patterns can be discerned.

#### Matters arising:

1. Saffron Housing had withdrawn their application.

The Council resolved to adopt The Code of Conduct including paragraph 12(2).
All village assets, i.e. The Hall, the War Memorial, bus shelter and the village sign were now fully insured.

**Drainage Matters**-The Vice chairman had sent a report of his dealings with Anglian Water who after 29 phone calls in one month plus a site visit, had agreed to re look at the way sewage was to be dealt with. Before W Foxley scheme can start, surveyors will look closely at E Foxley and if the two are to be linked.

The Emergency Plan still needed more volunteers; hopefully they would come from the Homewatch Team.

#### **Planning Applications**

DR Builders application for a pair of 2 bedroom cottages had been withdrawn . Permission was granted to Mr & Mrs Edwards for the demolition and erection of a single storey extension.

DR Builders had resubmitted their application regarding the above cottages but this time each dwelling would have 2 car spaces. Good deal of comment from the public and strong objections would be sent to Breckland.

**Village Matters** -Mr Bambridge was dealing with Andrew Grimley from Breckland regarding the smell of Mr Davis' pit at Church Farm Barns. He will monitor the situation.

The broken white barriers on the highway at Chapel Road (W) were inspected and put on the list for maintenance by Highways.

Councillor Hatch though absent, had penned a submission regarding a recent AGM

of the Village Hall at which the possibility of a permanent license was raised. A group of villagers were in total disagreement and the matter dropped. Councillor Hatch pointed out that the VHC gave of their time and efforts voluntarily for the benefit of the village as a whole and he felt that the opposition to the idea offered an insult to the committee for a reasonable and reasoned suggestion. He proposed that the Parish council expresses its appreciation and full support of the Hall Committee in its management of the Hall. The Council did so.

The painting of the Village Hall had been done in conjunction with Norfolk Probation Service and everyone agreed that they had done a great job. Highways were to be asked to cut brambles on the old road to Bawdeswell and to remove Natterjack signs from the verges.

**Finance:** The financial report was presented and signed. The clerk was given permission to go change the arrangements for the deposit account.

Date of the next meeting was booked for Tuesday 11 Dec at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

The meeting closed at 8.50pm

#### **BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL-EXTRACTS OF MEETING** HELD ON MONDAY 3<sup>rd</sup> SEPTEMBER 2007 AT 7.45pm IN THE VILLAGE HALL

**PRESENT**: Councillors Mallen, Shannon, Cockburn, Hipperson, Beane and Mason.

Mr. G. Bambridge (DC) 48 parishioners APOLOGIES: Councillor Lilwall. Mrs. I.Floering Blackman(CC) MINUTES OF LAST MEETING; Agreed and signed

The Chairman opened the meeting stating that the Parish Council had changed the format of meetings to try to encourage more Parishioners to attend and would, in the future, be inviting Officials to speak at the meetings – eg Breckland officials about Planning/LDF, Police etc – to help Parishioners understand the work/role of the Parish Council.

He then introduced the officials from Breckland Council – David Spencer (Principal Planning Policy Officer, Paul Harris and Lee Webster (Enabling & Projects Officer affordable housing) - to talk about the Local Development Framework and Bawdeswell's role within that strategy.

David Spencer handed out a booklet introducing the LDF and work carried out to date (Clerk has spare copies if anyone would like one). Breckland are looking at specific areas for development such as the large towns of Thetford and Dereham but also villages which could benefit from new housing and employment which are to be called Local Service Centres (Bawdeswell not identified in any draft LDF documents although it continues to develop). The criteria is for the village to have a population of 1,000+ parishioners, a school, shop, PO, doctors surgery, public transport and employment - Bawdeswell fulfils only two of those categories! The Local Plan would allow for infilling, conversions and suitable use of appropriately located previously developed land.

*Future role for Bawdeswell* – choices are: a) to promote Bawdeswell as a Local Service Centre or

b) broadly keep things as they are, where the settlement boundary stays largely as it is. Breckland will be consulting on final draft Strategy early 2008 and there is a <u>6 week</u> period for comment. Copies will be sent to PC.

The Parish Council now had to – formulate ideas/thoughts – encourage community involvement.

The Parish Council will keep Parishioners fully informed about developments.

The Chairman thanked everyone present for attending the meeting. Planning:

-32 Norwich Road -proposed replacement extension/conversion of existing garage to study/bedroom. NO OBECTIONS

-The Cottage, The Drift – proposed single storey linked detached annexe (resubmission) – PC objections – it is outside Settlement Boundary and does not demonstrate that it is essential in connection with agriculture, forestry etc. Also there appears little difference to original PA (refused) which could become separate building.

<u>New Code of Conduct</u>: The PC adopts the new Model Code of Conduct including paragraph 12(2) –effective immediately. Advert to be put in EDP under Breckland. <u>PO</u> – will officially close on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> September – Chairman and Clerk in discussion with Norfolk Rural Community Council as to the future of some sort of service in the village.



# BAWDESWELL BOOK CLUB

At our August meeting we discussed IF NOBODY SPEAKS OF REMARKABLE THINGS, by JON MCGREGOR


The remarkable thing about this novel is the beauty of the writing. From the opening lines 'the city it sings' – much of it is more like poetry than prose and it is worth reading for this alone.

The plot itself is fairly light. The main story focuses on the residents of an ordinary street in a northern town on a summer day –it is a slice of city living as many of us have experienced it – children playing in the street, students packing up their rooms, families eating breakfast, neighbours lighting a barbeque, coming ins and going outs. Many of the characters are only referred to by their descriptions – 'the girl with the square glasses' or the 'man with the scarred hands', which underlines the anonymity of our modern lives. Information is revealed slowly like layers unwrapping a piece at a time in a way that is compelling and small everyday dramas unfold. Overshadowing this is a sense of foreboding at the event the novel is leading up to which will briefly bind all the characters together.

I loved this novel for the language and the descriptions and the 'everyday'ness of it. If your idea of a good read is a fast-paced thriller, this is probably not for you. It is a 'love it or hate it' read and you will know from reading the first paragraph whether you want to curl up in an armchair with it or put it back on the shelf.

# From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

I heard a comment on the radio recently that said that your vote really does matter. Admittedly, until we get proportional representation, each individual vote won't make a difference. And we all suspect that if you live in a marginal constituency, your opinions count for more with central politicians than they do if you live in a safe seat.

But this comment was that, it is the type of voter you are that matters. This is because of analysis of profiles of actual voters. If, as currently happens, about three times as many sixty-year-olds vote as do twenty-year-olds, then politicians will want to please the sixty-year-olds. The implication is, that if you don't vote, the interests of your age-group will be damaged.

A recent poll on religious faith indicated that 43% of teenagers say they have no religion or faith, compared to 20% of those in their 20s and 8% of those over 65. I wonder if the two are connected. Do the young believe less in anything, whether God or politicians? And does this mean that they feel less as though they belong?

All young people want to become individuals, to find out who they are. But unless you become a mega-star – and not many people can do that, by definition – you're not as powerful as an individual as when you are the member of a group. If we have taught the young that collective action is not effective, we have done them a disservice.

Christians join together in worship for support, strength, and to be more effective. And in all our daily lives locally, there are environmental and other campaigns where each extra voice, each extra signature is of importance. Each time we make a positive vote with our feet, with our voice, with our name, we show that we belong. To belong to a group makes you no less of an individual.
