

Breakables, sharp objects ie scissors, liquids that may leak, perishable items.

If you feel you cannot fill a whole shoe box, we will be making up boxes in school and any bits and pieces will be welcome. A big box will be in the entrance hall for you to put gifts in if you would like to. There is plenty of time and we will give you the closure date after half-term.

If you could have your completed boxes to school by 10th November as they will be loaded onto the lorry on Saturday 13th November.

Have you heard about BAWDESWELL'S SUCCESS AT THE EDP PRIDE IN NORFOLK COMMUNITY AWARDS?

The 2010 Pride in Norfolk Community Awards, sponsored by the Eastern Daily Press and Norfolk County Council, were held at County Hall on Thursday, 30th September 2010. The awards were split between 5 categories, delineated by population-size, and Bawdeswell was therefore considered in the 'under 1,000 group'. We did so well to reach the final pair of villages, bearing in mind that we were competing in the largest group within Norfolk. However, we were, regrettably, pipped at the post by Great Massingham. Nevertheless, the judges declared it to be a very close-run race, and they were reportedly very impressed by the vibrancy of the community, the many activity groups in the village and the energy of the volunteers who help run them. Our 'runners-up' plaque will soon grace the walls of the Village Hall, and the prize of gardening vouchers will help improve the ambience in the village.

The prize-giving was, of course, simply the culmination of a long and arduous competitive process and, therefore, while you can all pat yourselves on the back for being part of the Bawdeswell community, our special thanks must go to all those volunteers who continue to give so freely of their time to make the village into the community it is, and in particular to James Lilwall and his team who masterminded the Bawdeswell bid for fame and who so clearly impressed the judges.

Thank you James for helping to put Bawdeswell so firmly on the map. It is now up to the rest of us to ensure that we not only stay there, but that we don't get pipped at the post again at next year's awards. I, for one, was very struck by the similarity between the achievements of Great Massingham and Bawdeswell; so we clearly don't need to do much more to reach that top spot. There is so much going on within this village nowadays, but all of our many activities and support groups rely heavily on voluntary help; so please join in and help the Bawdeswell community get its just reward at the 2011 Pride in Norfolk Awards! 

October Book: Anna Karenina by Leo Tolstoy

Acclaimed by some as the world's greatest novel, Tolstoy's Anna Karenina depicts a tragic story of obsessional love and its almost inevitable resulting pain and suffering. Side by side with Anna's tragedy develops another story, in many respects the history of Tolstoy and his wife. The parallels are innumerable: the love of Kitty and Levin is the transposition of Tolstoy's own domestic memories, just as the death of Levin's brother is the fateful evocation of the death of Tolstoy's brother. Like Tolstoy, Levin attacks 19th Century Russian society, hypocrisy, fashionable liberalism, drawing room religion – his campaign, too, is against the world 'which distorts all truthful feelings and inevitably crushes the generous enthusiasm of the mind'.

Tolstoy's approach is brilliantly analytical, revealing and absorbing. The book generated a good deal of discussion with a range of views although some members of the group found the task of 850 pages in a month somewhat challenging.

<u>BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL</u> DIGEST OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING ON 4TH OCTOBER 2010

Present: Councillors Shannon, Mason, Beane, Green, Lilwall, Kirby, Mallen, Mr G Bambridge, Mrs C Boer and 6 parishioners

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

Adams Pit: The Trustees have gained an NCC Countryside Conservation Grant of £994.00 towards the cost of the next phase of refurbishment work, excavation of the Pit and creation of a pond dipping platform. The work should start in the next couple of weeks, but the Clerk will warn of the exact date via notices around Adams Pit and the Parish Council notice board. The Trustees would like to take this opportunity to ask parishioners to keep clear and stay safe while contactors are working in this area. Parents are also asked to instruct their children not to play in this area during this work.

<u>Allotments:</u> The Chairman and Clerk have met with a second landowner to discuss the leasing of land for allotments. While the landowner was not averse in principle to leasing land for allotments, if it was well managed, an uplift clause in the original purchase agreement for the land in question would prevent this, unless associated housing development allowed the owners to maximise the financial potential of the property. Members of the Bawdeswell Allotment & Leisure Gardens Association also asked the Parish Council to investigate the possibility of leasing land close to Adams Pit. The Chairman and Clerk have been directed to pursue this and the other land options still open. The Parish Council would like to assure members of the BALGA that it is doing it utmost to find land for allotments and, although attempts so far have not been fruitful, the Parish Council is not discouraged.

Any Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

<u>Norfolk Police:</u> With the withdrawal of the mobile police van from the village, the Dereham Safe Neighbourhood Team have sought to assure the Parish Council that the community will be patrolled by police and community support officers but could not give an undertaking for timetabled patrols or a minimum amount of patrol time. Our SNT would like to arrange a local surgery to meet with the public; the Parish Council has therefore suggested that this might be held in the Church on a morning when the Post Office is open. The Clerk will advertise the details of this police surgery once they are known.

EDP Pride in Norfolk Awards 2010: Bawdeswell is on the map! The village came runners up in the EDP Pride in Norfolk 'Under 1000 population' community village award. The Chairman and Clerk were presented with a runner's up plaque, which will be displayed in the village hall, and £40 worth of garden centre vouchers, which will be put towards the purchase of more plants for the children's play area. Well done to everyone involved in community events or groups. Next year we aim to be winners!

Matters Arising

Anglian Water Sewerage Pumping Station

There are still people being connected to the sewerage system at this time, in some places around Foxley there is still in need of a clear up on verges.

Highway Issues

Mr. Harvey has contacted PCSO Angela Powles concerning speeding along the A1067 and also overtaking manoeuvres past the traffic island, which was passed on to the traffic officer.

Mr. Bambridge has advised us to contact Swaffham Police direct.

Repairs have been done to the road at Moor Farm, but concerns were raised as to the standard of the repairs with the general feeling being that they might not withstand the winter weather.

Potholes have now started appearing on both sides of Foxley. Clerk to contact Highways.



WWII EVACUEES IN BAWDESWELL


Dolphins Class at Bawdeswell School has been learning about the wartime Evacuees in the 1940's. *See page 7*. Here are two first hand accounts by Evacuees who came to Bawdeswell, from the Reeve's Tale website. <u>www.bawdeswell.net</u>

Sheila Berry wrote this: "I used to live in The Rectory at **Bawdeswell** during the war. My granny (Nell Callaghan) lived with my mother (Hannah O'Brien) and us children in The Rectory. My granny actually died there. We were evacuated from London during the war around 1943. My father was in the army. My aunty Nell Donaghue and her family (2 boys and 2 girls) lived in The Willows, which I remember quite clearly and I also remember seeing the wreck of the church opposite which was hit by the plane. It didn't really affect me because I was only about 5 at the time. The thing that affected me most was when my lovely dog 'Binky' was hit by a lorry outside The Willows. We buried him in the back garden."

Diana Bolton dictated this: "I was 3 when the war started. I lived in Poplar with my family, my father became a fireman in the docks at Orchard Place. We lived very near to the East India Docks and there were frequent air raids. During one of these a bomb fell at the bottom of our street. We were still in the house at the time on our way to our brick built street shelter.

For most of the war I was in London attending Primary School but when the Doodle Bugs started my father who saw the first one fall insisted we went away. I was seven. My sister, Betty Tremain (11 years old) and I went to a village in Norfolk. We arrived at East Dereham railway station where we boarded buses to be taken to our destination. We arrived at **Bawdeswell** and were taken into the village hall. The children with their mothers soon found people to have them this left just two pairs of sisters. A lady came in and pointed at my sister and one of the other sisters and said "I'll take these." I felt very lonely but my sister soon sorted it out and we went with Mrs Fenn.

They had no children but made us very welcome. We soon got used to pumping the water and using a candle to go to bed. She cooked using a primus stove or an oven heated by a coal fire. In the evenings we read by the light of an oil lamp. We went to the village school where there were just three other children of my age. Things were very quiet compared to London but excitement one morning. A German plane had crashed on the village church during the night. We stayed just over a year until after VE Day returning to London in September in time for the celebration parties."

Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Our speaker for September can be found in Debretts: nothing but the best for us. Professor Ian Newton, OBE gave a learned presentation on the highlights of a long term study of Sparrowhawks. These monogamous birds had suffered a sharp decline due to the use of organochlorine pesticides but have make a good recovery and are now quite widespread. Their diet consists almost entirely of woodland birds although the female, which is the larger of the pair, can take the odd pigeon or Partridge. They produce young in early summer, coinciding with the peak of the songbird population. They have up to six young but 72% die before breeding and only 22% actually breed. Their population has remained fairly stable over the period 1970 – 1990. Not especially long lived, only about 10% reaching 10 years. For those who like to explore the subject further, the Professor has written a book on the subject called, as one would expect, 'The Sparrowhawk'.

Red Kites: Members of the society receive a monthly newsletter. Expertly edited by David Knight it contains articles and bird sightings contributed by members. September's newsletter has reports of Red Kites seen within the valley. I hope the gentleman, who rang me saying he thought he saw a Red Kite, reads this because, during a senior moment, I seem to have mislaid his phone number.

So much going on in the society and so little space to report. Briefly we did a trip to Snettisham to see the awesome sight of 50,000 waders in flight over the Wash. We had a bird workshop on Pipits, Larks, small Finches and Buntings. We will be at the 'Wild about Norfolk' fair in Dereham and we are taking part in a new initiative to study Marsh and Willow Tits in the Wensum Valley.

Dates for November: Thursday 18^{th} , at Weston Longville Village Hall, a talk to brighten the winter months – "Trinidad and Tobago - Terns, Tropicbirds, Trogons and Turtles", by Julia Black. Starts at 7.30. Our outdoor trip is to Chris Skinner's 'High Ash' farm on Saturday 27^{th} . All are welcome to both events but please note there is a small charge of £2 for non-members.





Letter from the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

The rescue of the Chilean miners from 700 metres below the surface is a wonderful story of determination and hope. People did not believe it could be done, or done so quickly.

Yet one of the side-effects of being in darkness so long was that, in order to accustom their eyes to the light, the miners had to wear dark glasses. Previous experiments have shown that to stay in darkness for a long time is very disorienting, and that the sufferers lose co-ordination.

At the very end of last month, the clocks went back, so that mornings are lighter, and the evenings are suddenly much darker. It's taken me quite a while of living here to realise that the darkness does affect me. Having lived in towns or well-lit suburbs for the previous thirty years, I thought it was very romantic not to have street lights, and I enjoyed the resourcefulness of people who adapted to it. It seemed that the ultimate is to knit your own wind-up torch!

Already we start to cheer ourselves up with lights that anticipate Christmas, the festival that was intentionally put three days after the darkest part of the year as the days begin to get lighter. November can be full of sadness, with Remembrance Sunday and its sorrow matching the cold dying of the year. For some people, their dislike of the shorter days is offset by leaves falling and more sky to see.

Dealing with darkness is partly practical – it makes sense to use the daylight as best we can, and to be visible when walking at night. Dealing with darkness is also a matter of our mood; so to be kind, we need to think of those who might close the doors at dusk and become isolated. Winter parties are good things to arrange.

Light has always been an image for the presence of God, in many religious traditions. The darkness does not overcome it. As the days get darker, may you find people, thoughts, and practical things that give you light in your life.
