I am writing to congratulate Bawdeswell Parish Council on it's decision to consider moving the Parish's money away from HSBC to a more ethical bank.

Most big banks in the UK, including HSBC, have been heavily criticised lately for their part in the current economic difficulties as well as for their enormous bonus payments. But they can rightly also be criticised for a myriad of other questionable business practices including: speculating on food prices and so increasing hunger in the developing world; avoiding tax through the use of tax havens; investing in polluting industries; as well as financing oppressive regimes, the arms trade and unnecessary animal experimentation.

Whatever ethical criteria are important to us as individuals it is obvious that the HSBC bank is a poor moral choice for us as a parish to place our money with and the Council is right to consider the alternatives. Bravo!

#### **BAG – ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING**

The Annual General Meeting of Bawdeswell Activities Group will be held in Bawdeswell Village Hall at 10 am on Thursday 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2012

This meeting is open to all residents of Bawdeswell and surrounding villages.

At this meeting, the existing Chair (organiser/administrator) will be standing down and someone is needed to take over this position.



We have now received formal approval of our planning application for the new village hall. Although there are nine conditions on the approval, none of these are major and can be easily achieved.

The major outcome of the meeting on 25<sup>th</sup> February was the setting up of a special funding sub-group to pursue our application to The Big Build Lottery Fund. The Sub-Group has had two meetings and has established that before Stage 1 of the three-part application can be submitted, the Lottery Fund require that we carry out a further survey to get up to date feedback from everyone who lives in Bawdeswell on the "needs" of villagers relating to all aspects of village life.

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#### **BOOK CLUB**



#### To the Lighthouse by Virginia Woolf

To the Lighthouse was written in 1927 and is set in the decade between 1910 and 1920.

The first part of novel centres on a day in the life of the Ramsey family and various houseguests during a summer break on the Isle of Skye. The mood is set on the first page when Mr and Mrs Ramsey deal very differently with the possibility of whether the weather will be suitable for 6 year old James to make a long awaited trip to the lighthouse-tantalisingly visible just across the bay from their holiday home. Mrs Ramsey handling the situation with optimism and Mr Ramsey providing the crushing blow that bad weather is predicted and no trip will take place. This mood continues to travel through the book. We then skip 10 years (with no explanation as to why) to play catch up with the fate of the various characters ending with a number of the original party revisiting the house to complete unfinished business.

The book is widely considered to be autobiographical and, through the characters, provides a vehicle for VW to explore her own strengths and weaknesses as well as her perception of women, men and of class.

The book is written in a style often used by VW- "stream of consciousness"-which results in the writer frequently going off at a tangent to include seemingly unrelated thoughts. In the main the writing style, coupled with the lack of a single narrator, was not favoured by the group but it was also agreed that this also lead to passages of pure poetry. "But what after all is one night? A short space, especially when the darkness dims so soon, and so soon a bird sings, a cock crows, or a faint green quickens, like a turning leaf, in the hollow of the wave."

#### **BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL**

#### **DIGEST OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 5 March 2012**

<u>Present:</u> Councillors Shannon, Mason, Beane, Kirby, Mallen, Lilwall, Mr G Bambridge (District Councillor) and Mrs C Boer (Clerk)

#### **Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings**

Adams Pit: The Chairman reported that the Trustees have now received the £1081.50 match funding grant from NCC. Unfortunately there has been an episode of minor vandalism at Adams Pit where youths decided to remove the canes and covers from the newly planted hawthorn/blackthorn saplings. This was reported to the SNT and as a result the Police have been undertaking more patrols of this area. The PC would like to thank the two parishioners who have kindly replaced all the covers and canes and therefore preventing any permanent damage to the saplings. More planting of native wildlife plants is scheduled to take place in the next few months and, therefore, if any parishioners have any surplus English-native plants (primrose, bluebell etc) that they would like to donate for future planting please contact the Clerk.

<u>Allotments:</u> No further progress on producing the draft business plan for the creation of the community resource has been made, as the Chairman is still awaiting supporting information from BALGA. He is still making contact with local landowners about the possibility of the PC purchasing land as an alternative to leasing.

<u>Parish Clerk Vacancy:</u> Four applications have been received for the position of Parish Clerk. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman will undertake the interviews and have been given the responsibility to make a suitable selection on behalf of the PC. The decision will be formally ratified by Councillors at the next PC meeting where the new Clerk will be in attendance.

#### **Planning**

<u>3PL/2012/0087/F:</u> Cobblers Cottage The Street, en-suite and kitchenette extension to rear elevation; the PC had no objections to this application.

<u>3PL/2011/1393/F:</u> Heath Cottage Dereham Road, extensions and alterations (resubmission); planning permission granted with 9 conditions.

<u>3PL/2011/1212/F:</u> Land west of Heath Cottage Dereham Road, 2 low cost starter homes; the PC have been notified that an appeal from the applicant has been made to the Secretary of State in respect of the refusal of planning permission by Breckland. The PC should be notified of the date of the site meeting by the Inspector and although no further representation can be made by interested parties at the meeting, except in response to questions by the Inspector, the PC agreed that a representative of the PC should attend.

#### **Any Other Business of Interest to Parishioners**

2012 Annual Parish Meeting and Annual Parish Council Meeting: Note for your diaries: it has been agreed that the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> May at 18.30 in the Village Hall. The format will be the same as in 2011 with slots for County Councillor, District Councillor, Chairman of PC and School Head with all local organizations/voluntary groups being invited. It was also agreed that the

Annual Parish Council Meeting and first Parish Council meeting of the new Parish Council year will be held on Monday 14 May.

Meeting with Highways Official: The Clerk has met with a Highways Official to discuss various issues that the PC raised regarding parking around congested areas of the village and extending the current 20mph speed limit to the school. Highways stated there was no possibility of having any additional 'H' bars in areas identified by the PC, due to the current policy being that such markings were restricted to access points serving 5 or more properties. To extend the existing 20 mph speed limit would require the introduction of a new Traffic Regulation Order which. This in turn would involve a feasibility study, consultation with stakeholders, and finally a legal order set by the Department of Transport. As these are fairly costly, NCC is only able to investigate locations which are high priority, such as locations where regular accidents are occurring. As an alternative, some 'Think Slow' temporary signs will be placed under the current speed restrictions for 2-3 months in the near future. Highways did think that angle parking along Billingford Rd, to assist parents when dropping/picking up children at the school, might be possible and would, therefore, be investigated. The footpath resurfacing along Norwich Rd from the Street to the Garden Centre is due to take place during the financial year 2012-2013. All current road markings within the Parish will also be repainted shortly. The Highways Parish Ranger is due to address any minor items noted by the PC, such as pot holes, cutting back verges etc, in the first week of April.

Ethical Choice of Bank Account. The PC expressed sympathy with the concerns expressed in a letter received from a parishioner about the poor ethical choice of bank that the PC uses. However, these ethical concerns had to be balanced with the business efficiency of the PC. The PC agreed to look again at the issue, and the parishioner's recommendations for alternative banking institutions, once the ability of those institutions, and in particular the county-wide Norfolk credit union, had been established.

<u>Transfer of Land at the Street (Folland Court):</u> The PC is still awaiting the transfer of this land from Flagship Housing, but it has received confirmation that this land will be turfed before handover. While the PC previously agreed that, once transferred, the land would be made into a small memorial garden, the PC have further agreed that this area will also focus on the celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. The Chairman has agreed to create a draft plan and approximate costs of such a garden.

Emergency Plan: In 2011 the PC expressed a wish to press forward with the proposal to introduce an Emergency Plan and planning framework for the village, aimed at protecting the community, and in particular its vulnerable residents, in case of local emergency (accidents, bad weather, loss of power etc). To do this the PC needs to recruit coordinator to help draft the framework, albeit with the help of the Breckland Emergency Planning Officer and PC. If you are keen to help your community in this regard then please contact the Parish Clerk.

Deputy Chief Constable Simon Bailey said: "Staff reductions brought about by the financial challenge has meant we needed to find a new way of delivering this important service. Police Direct offers communities updates direct from their local police teams to their desktops, laptops, landlines or mobiles. Armed with this information, people can become more involved in keeping themselves, their families and their communities safe."

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#### Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Hardley Flood: Hardley Flood is a Site of Special Scientific Interest on the north bank of the River Chet near Loddon and was the venue for our monthly field trip. Eighteen members set off onto the marsh where a male Sparrowhawk was spotted. Then on to Hardley Flood where Reed Bunting, and Marsh Tit were seen. On reaching the raised broadwalk the group had their first open view of the Flood. The tide was out and over twenty species were noted including gulls, Black-tailed Godwits and Redshanks. In all 73 bird species were seen throughout the day plus a Muntjac, Chinese Water Deer, Brown Hare and a Stoat. A great birding day in a great area, a first trip for the club.

Indoor Talk - Welney's wintering wildfowl: One of the visitor highlights at the World Wildlife Trust Reserve at Welney, near Wisbech, is watching a warden with a wheelbarrow full of grain feeding thousands of overwintering swans and ducks. We were fortunate to welcome Samantha Lee, less wheelbarrow but complete with boundless enthusiasm for her work, to our indoor talk. She talked about the management of the reserve and the Whooper and Berwick swans that arrive in their thousands from Iceland and Russia for the winter. Last year a Whooper called Julietta was injured and unable to make the 1,000-mile journey back to the breeding ground. Her mate Romeo, stayed by her side and they became the first whooper swans to breed in Norfolk since 1928. Last year (2011), 41 species were observed including 19 species of ducks, arriving in their thousands from the Arctic region, also waders, birds of prey, geese, owls and cranes. As to be expected Welney has an excellent website with lots of visitor information and publishes daily wildlife sightings. A delightful presentation by an eloquent and enthusiastic speaker.

**Important Note!! Dates for April and Change of venue:** In April, Weston Longville Village Hall (along with memories of my youth) is to be demolished and replaced by a modern community centre. Therefore our April to September meetings will be at the North Elmham Memorial Hall. On Thursday 19<sup>th</sup>, at the new venue, we hold our AGM followed by a talk on **Foxley Wood**. On the 28<sup>th</sup>, our outdoor meeting is to Foxley Wood.

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
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#### Benefice News and Events

#### THE ARTICHOKE COLLECTION

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#### All Saints, Bawdeswell

The great festival of Easter is upon us and we find a number of special services which occur only at this time of the church's year. The form of these services (the liturgy) goes back to the earliest days of

Christianity as we seek to recall and remember the events of that first Easter. Please do not be put off by the unfamiliar but take the opportunity to walk with Jesus through Holy Week and Easter.

The first of April is Palm Sunday when we see the distribution and blessing of palms and then, after commemorating the entry into Jerusalem, the reading of the Passion as the Gospel at Holy Communion.

On Maundy Thursday, the Last Supper will be remembered at Sparham and on Good Friday there will be services at Foxley and Lyng and walks from Elsing and Sparham to the Rectory at Lyng.

On Saturday (Easter Eve) we begin our celebration of Easter in the late evening (20:30) with the lighting of the new fire, the vigil, the renewal of baptismal promises and culminating in the first mass of Easter. Every confirmed member of the church should make their communion at Easter and this is your opportunity in Bawdeswell. The service takes a little over an hour.

On Easter Day we will have our Easter GiG at 10:30. This is especially for children but all ages are equally welcome. It is not a communion service and has been very well attended since we started it about 5 years ago. We now have a Music Group who give us a wide range of songs to enhance our worship. Please come.

We have now also reached the end of the first quarterly cycle of the new rota of Sunday services in the benefice. This has changed our pattern at Bawdeswell and is taking a bit of getting used to but we need to give it some time to see if it will work. The main change has been that David our Rector now joins us on a different Sunday each month. We still see him once a month at 10:30 but now not always on the first Sunday. This means that in some months there is not a Holy Communion service at 10:30. In those months, a short said celebration of Holy Communion is held at 12:00 noon on the first Sunday, so there are two services that day – you can come to either or both, with coffee in between. We are trying the Order for Morning Prayer from Common Worship – again, we need to give it some space before drawing too many conclusions. The PCC and the benefice churchwardens will be reviewing the pattern in the autumn and will welcome feedback in the light of the longer experience we will have had by then.

#### From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

I would like to thank everybody who sent cards or good wishes when my father died recently, and to thank people for their patience and understanding when I wasn't concentrating properly on my work.

I preached at my father's funeral, and included this part of a poem of his called *Burnham Overy Church*, where he habitually worshipped:

Holy ground this is, and set apart; not because God made more His own what lies in Him already; rather that He chooses here from soul to soul to let some lyric of his love be heard.

Places acquire meaning not only from their natural beauty, but also because of the uses to which we put them or the significant events that have happened there. At Easter time, Christians think not only about the events at the end of Jesus' earthly life, but also the places where he was. Jerusalem, the Garden of Gethsemane, Golgotha, the tomb, the garden of the resurrection are all part of the story.

We live in villages where the buildings are part of our story. Those who have arrived recently will not remember how new-builds changed views, as longer residents will. Most of our historic buildings, also, have recent adaptations and changes, sometimes with additions and decorations, sometimes even with change of use. And some buildings are currently acquiring meaning by their use.

The intention to build new village halls in both Bawdeswell and Lyng comes from the desire to build community, to say something about what we mean to each other. The success of the village hall build at Elsing, refurbishment at Foxley, and the adaptation of the school in Sparham to community use, all provide buildings that mean we believe we belong.

In their own ways, but not exclusively, our churches and halls provide us with a place to hear and be heard by God and one another.
