

The Parish Council donated £200 towards the event and along with Margaret Roy's kind contribution we were able to buy a souvenir for all the children of the village (Primary School age and younger).







The Council agreed to continue with pursuing allotment land, to pursue improved bus provision, to complete the Folland Court Jubilee Garden, to look into the Elmham Home Care Scheme, to continue to support the new Village Hall and Project Bawdeswell and also the Council are about to address the village green.

7.5.12 <u>Apologies</u>: None.

8.5.12 <u>Minutes of Meeting</u>: The minutes of the previous meeting held on 2^{nd} April 2012 were agreed and signed.

9.5.12 <u>Declarations of Interest</u>: DS/CB declared personal interests on item 5 as potential allotment holders should this facility become available for the parish.

10.5.12 Public Participation and County/District Councillor Reports: None.

Matters Arising Not Covered Elsewhere on Agenda

11.5.12 <u>Possible Provision of Allotments</u>: Some responses have been received. One is for an offer of 2.5 acres of land the Parish Council could purchase at £20,000 per acre. The land is on Swanton Morley road and a track leads to the land behind houses on Dereham Road. Access for vehicles would be difficult. Another positive reply is with regard to land near Two Fields Way but the owner is contractually obliged to seek capital gain from this land for development. The dialogue will continue with the landowners and those that have not replied as yet will be reminded that a reply is sought.

12.5.12 Folland Court - Transfer of Land to the Parish Council & Creation of a

<u>Memorial/Queens Jubilee Garden</u>: The ground has now been cleared and turfed by the housing association. The Council will not be spending any money on the site until it is legally Parish Council land. Manure is being donated and will be rotovated. Norfolk County Council can help with match funding for the wildflower area but that cannot be pursued until the land transfer has taken place. Donations of native wildflower plants would be appreciated.

13.5.12 Request from Homewatch in Reeves Close for 3x Homewatch signs at $\pounds 20$ each: All were in agreement to fund the signs. Homewatch is to be encouraged and the Council hope that more Home Watch Committees will be set up in the village.

Village Hall Committee and Project Bawdeswell

14.5.12 The materials for improvements to the Village Hall driveway have been ordered and will be laid once the weather improves. CCTV is still an active issue with the Village Hall Committee. JL reported that the village is currently being re-surveyed and a 50% return rate is required. AK has created a template for results. The Committee have recently met with the Lottery regarding new hall funding and were positively received. The business plan and feasibility study are now complete and there will be an open meeting to discuss these on 19th June – all welcome.

Clerks Report

15.5.12 The Clerk reported on a reply received from Ian Sharman of NCC Highways regarding The Green. Highways wish to hold on to this land for road safety reasons. However, they have no objections to the Parish Council having the village sign there along with the planters and continuing to maintain the area. The Council are happy to continue to maintain The Green but will consider allocating an amount from the Precept next year to fund this. The ethical banking suggestion needs further research. Services offered by alternative organisations needs to be balanced against the current services the PC has and its needs. The discussion will continue and further research into Norfolk Credit Union and facilities on offer with the Co-op to present a factual appraisal at the next meeting.

Finance

16.5.12 <u>Payments</u>: Payments approved at the meeting by the Parish Council: cheque no 100721 £28 Village Hall Hire for Annual Parish Meeting 22^{nd} May, cheque no 100722 £130 to JD Home & Garden Services for work on Noticeboard, 100723 £1.09 to Clerk for Expenses, 100724 £160 to Clerk for April salary, 100725 £40.00 to HMRC for April's Clerk tax.

Payments approved prior to the meeting by the Parish Council: None. 17.5.12 <u>Annual Return for the year ending 31st March 2012</u>: A copy of the cash book and accounts reconciliation was distributed to all Councillors. All were in agreement that the Chairman sign and approve the accounts.

18.5.12 Other Finance Business: None.

Planning

19.5.12 Cobblers Cottage, The Street – application for a double garage (to be attached to new extension) with attic storage space above. The Council will report back to Breckland DC with comments that there is concern that the garage will be on the site of a removed tree in a conservation area and will also question the validity of removing that tree – was conservation permission given. Also, should planning be granted a condition should be added that the attic space cannot be converted into a living space in the future as this would be classed as garden infill and therefore against Breckland DC's current policy.

20.5.12 Permission noted for Cobblers Cottage, The Street – for en-suite and kitchenette extension to rear elevation.

21.5.12 Permission noted for School House, Billingford Road – for single storey side extensions to create garage, utility room and bathroom.

22.5.12 GB reported that an inspector visited the site of the appealed application for 2x starter homes, west of Heath Cottage. The PC was not informed of this visit. GB will ask questions as to why and report back to the PC.

23.5.12 The application for a touring caravan park on Elmham Road, Billingford was discussed. Concerns have been raised by Billingford, Worthing and Elmham Parish Councils. It will be on the site of a roman settlement and has protected status. It will be put before the planning committee in July and all comments and letters will be counted. The PC will write to support the other PC's concerns and also to raise the concern of increased traffic and to point out that Bawdeswell Parishioners enjoy this

area of outstanding natural beauty in the Wensum Valley and the proposal will detract from the ambience and amenity value of the area.

Any Other Business

24.5.12 Items Notified in Advance to the Clerk for Agenda: None.

25.5.12 <u>To discuss any items raised at the meeting</u>: It was raised that there had been some complaints regarding the churchyard and its lack of maintenance. The matter is in hand with the PCC. AK is still pursuing a footway access to the Heath. Some responses have been received but further dialogue will be held. Highways are in favour of the idea and will support the PC. AMc will be consulting with BT and a NCC tree officer to carry out a survey on the churchyard trees to see which need attention.

26.5.12 <u>To receive agenda items for the next meeting</u>: Common Lane will be addressed. Bus services that run through the village will be discussed, along with any timetable changes.

Bawdeswell Cemetery

The Parish Council has passed on to me a number of comments about the upkeep of the churchyard extension, as the cemetery is correctly called. The extension belongs to the church who have managed it since it was created in the late 1800s. The church is very grateful to those who provide grass-cutting on a voluntary basis and the church also pays for a contractor to cut the grass once a month for six months of the year and the hedge occasionally, when it grows out of control. This costs the church between $\pounds 300 - \pounds 500$ a year and we do not receive any support other than burial fees which amount to only about $\pounds 200$ a year.

People with family buried in all rural cemeteries are often concerned about neglect of their cemetery and will usually argue in favour of public subsidy of its maintenance, but people having no connection with the cemetery will argue that public spending comes from *their* taxes and should be spent, quite bluntly, on the living and not the departed.

Ultimately *it is the responsibility of families to maintain their individual family graves and gravestones.* We will do our best to tame the worst of the long grass and the hedging, but we need all the voluntary help we can get. Thank you those who do help us already.


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Review: Pigeon English by Stephen Kelman

Have you wondered '*Why did it happen*' or '*How could it have happened*', when hearing any of the news reports about young boys dying from knife attacks on our streets?

Pigeon English, a first novel written by Stephen Kelman, helped me understand just how easy it is for these tragic events to happen. Although the book gives away the likely ending on the first page, I hoped all the way through that I'd be wrong. This is the story of Harri, a 9 year old Ghanaian immigrant who is learning to live in the streets of his south London high-rise estate. Much of his story is in dialogue and it brings to life the horror and squalor of high-rise living, you can smell those oddly coloured puddles. We begin to understand the sacrifices that have been made for Mamma, Harri and sister Lydia to travel to London whilst Father and baby sister Agnes are still in Ghana. Can you imagine what it must be like to deliberately burn away your finger prints? His friendships, life at school and his activities have an underlying menace, keeping in with strong gang leaders is vital. It becomes easy to see how peer pressure tips pranks into 'unsocial behaviour' - throwing stones at buses, and then into violence. How his gang knock down an old and doddery man, only for the fun of kicking and treading on his meagre groceries is chilling, as it foretells some of the future.

The title appears to be a pun, covering some of the slang language that sprinkles his dialogue and because Harri comes to believe that his pigeon is watching over him. Unfortunately the final violent act comes out of the blue and is so quick that the pigeon can only look over him.

We wondered whether Harri could have avoided his destiny if he'd not done some things, not made the wrong friends or if his Mamma could have had more time to look after him, instead of working so hard. You would hope so, for all the young boys out there, but in this story it is unclear.

We thought that whilst the story is quite 'dark' it did make us smile and even made one of our group laugh out loud on the bus to Norwich, quite a feat for someone who starts her journey so early in the morning. And his hopes for the burgeoning love for Poppy is very tender and can take us back to younger, more wistful times.

The message is clear though. The streets are dangerous places, especially so, for young black boys who feel the need to keep in with the crowd.

We felt that this was a book worth reading, and I would urge you to try it too! cg

Barry spoke of huge fires they get called out to but he said that the most common cause of fire is in the kitchen. A good tip to remember – shut the door to prevent the fire spreading and call the Fire Service.

Barry then showed us the latest smoke alarm. He said all homes should have one and he explained that if requested, one of the local fire crews would come to your house and install free smoke alarms. We then examined the fireproof clothing etc that is essential for them and we all agreed it had been a most interesting talk.

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

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
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St Thomas' Foxley Restoration

We have now received the necessary approvals for the bell restoration project from the various authorities. We have been given a Faculty, approval from English Heritage and passed a bat survey, all positive. So having all of that under our belt I was then able to apply for a grant from the 'Your Heritage Lottery' fund. We shall know in 10 weeks whether or not our request for £43000 was successful. If it is then we may well have the project completed by the end of the year. If not I shall have to find some more money from somewhere as we don't have enough to do the job properly. The bell ringing learning is moving on a pace now – I am indebted to those in the group and others who have stuck with it.

We were also granted a Faculty for a new Coffee area, which has been successful. We were able to move a pew front and create a space at the front of the nave. We have recycled the original pew to the chancel, and the door to a gap in the rood screen. It fits the exactly, which is very fortunate. The rood screen in Foxley is quite famous, it was repaired in the 16^{th} century after the damage done in the Reformation – those repairs last today.
