Burns Night in Foxley

On Wednesday 25th January (when else?) 2012 in the village hall of our small village of Foxley we celebrated the birth of the famous Scottish poet Robert Burns.

Bawdeswell's resident Scot Stewart Cormie, and his wife Anne, under the aegis of the Foxley Village Hall Committee prepared an evening of suitable enjoyments for the sixty or so people who had bought tickets to attend. Two long candle-lit tables were set out for wining and dining – with more than enough "beverages" for the frequent toasts that were to follow. The locally made Haggis was duly piped and clapped in, and then with the traditional incantation was set about with a large carving knife wielded by Stewart, dressed for the occasion from the wardrobe of Rob Roy! With tables laden with "neeps" and "tatties" prepared by the ladies of the V.H.C., our plates were generously filled, and the serious part of the evening could commence!

After the food had been consumed, Stewart gave us a potted but knowledgeable history of the poet – warts and all! – which was given from memory rather than notes (so he would have us believe). We were all suitably impressed. Then, as is the custom, a lady is expected to counter the male chauvinism that was rampant in the life of the great man. The gauntlet was picked up by Christine Rushbrook, who then delivered a light-hearted (but with some uncomfortable "truths" neatly sown in) counterblast from the ladies' point of view.

After the final toast the tables and chairs were cleared to a safe distance, and the sound system was tested. It was time for the *ceilidh*. There was no shortage of volunteers to be taught the steps of the various Scottish dances by West Foxley's Lorrie Tallis, who quickly had them all whirling to the pipes and drums. Scottish dancing, by the way, was not intended for flimsy buildings!

When the evening finally drew to a close, when that diminished group of those of sound wind and limb had been forced to surrender the floor, and the doors were open to the night air, the talk among the small groups travelling the dark lanes home could only have been of the wonderful evening just enjoyed. 

If you have this book on your shelf waiting to be read, decide now if you want to know how it ends before I get to the bit that will give the plot away. On the other hand you might feel more able to read it if I assure you that this is not just another hostage tale. I've read this twice now, first when it was nominated on the 2010 Man Booker Prize list and now again because it was our January book choice. I think I got more out of it the second time because I wasn't racing to the end to see what happened....... Did they 'get away'?. And yes they did! Initially I read the book as 'a page turner' but this time I found it more compelling because I took it more slowly to see it as a five year old and try to make sense of this rather strange world that we live in and take for granted.

This is a story told by five-year-old Jack. His daily pattern gives a flavour of his days with Ma, who must be one of the most inventive mothers in entertaining and educating her son that I have come across. But of course she has to be, as she is also in Room. All nouns in Jack's story are introduced without pronouns, he has no need of them because they are the only items he has ever encountered. There are no other rooms, rugs, spoons, plants. Ma's love for Jack is all encompassing. It has to be because she has nobody else unless you consider Old Nick. He is the chap who kidnapped Ma all those years ago and continues to deal out rape, hurt and presents in unequal measure. He has all the power until Ma decides that Jack is now five and old enough to lead an escape.

So what's new there I can almost hear you say. Well for me the story is just going to get more interesting, because now they have to learn to live Outside. Whilst Ma can remember what it was like, Jack hasn't a clue about this world. Even wind on his face is strange, to say nothing of dealing with shoes, steps and other people and don't forget, don't stroke a furry bumble bee. They don't like it.

Ma was very good in Room being with Jack, but now the authorities are getting involved. There seems to be end of them: police, doctors, psychiatrists, social workers, publicists, they all have their parts to play, but they tend to ignore Ma's great influence and through questions and 'help' they push Ma towards a crisis. Ma's relatives have difficulties too. Coming to terms with a daughter back from the dead, is difficult once the euphoria wears off, and now she has a son too. It has to be said that some of their interventions are bizarre and some group members found unbelievable.

There isn't an End to this book. It isn't 'neat'. No happy walks into the sunset. But Jack and Ma are together. They have a flat with rooms and <u>they</u> have the key.

So if you've not read it yet, have a go and see what the world looks like from a supplanted five year old instead of what we might see on a routine and daily basis.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MEETING ON 6TH FEBRUARY 2012

<u>Present:</u> Councillors Shannon, Mason, Beane, Kirby, Mallen, Lilwall, Mrs C Boer (Clerk) and 1 parishioner.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

<u>Adams Pit</u>: As a result of the recent application for matched funding for the final phase of work on Adams Pit, Norfolk County Council has offered a grant of 75% towards the cost and, therefore, the Trustees will shortly receive £1081.50 from NCC once all the grant offer paperwork has been completed.

<u>Allotments:</u> The Chairman had made no progress on producing the draft business plan for the creation of the community resource allotments, due to other priorities and the lack of support information from BAGLA. However, due to the possible prospect of the Parish Council being stuck with a long-term lease of the Elsing Lane land, should local support for allotments dwindle due to the remote location of this site, coupled with a report that a local town council had recently managed to buy amenity land with only a minor increases in its Precept, the Parish Council have agreed to reopen the debate on whether or not to purchase/lease more suitable land closer to the village.

Planning

<u>PA 3PL/2012//F School House, Billingford Rd:</u> single storey side extensions to create garage and carport, utility room and bathroom; the Parish Council had no objections to this application. <u>PA 3PL/2011/0756/F Bawdeswell Village Hall:</u> demolition of existing hall erection of new hall, extended parking and install air source heat pump; planning permission granted with 9 conditions. <u>PA 3PL/2011/121/F Land west of Heath Cottage, Dereham Rd</u>: 2 low cost starter homes; refusal of planning permission.

Any Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

<u>Village Sign:</u> Mr Thatcher, the artist, has made the requested minor alternation to the sign.

<u>Flexibus:</u> Norfolk County Council have reported that, unfortunately, the Foulsham feeder scheme would no longer be going ahead, as Foulsham had made alternative arrangements with Norfolk Green. Consequently, Bawdeswell will not be able to utilise this feeder service to provide its residents with public transport to Dereham. NCC has looked into alternative ways of providing a flexible pre-bookable service for Bawdeswell residents, but this is likely to be too expensive because of a lack of transport providers in the area. However, following NCC advice, the Parish Council will register its interest in linking up with a flexible transport service that Reepham are setting up using an electric minibus they have purchased through the Low Carbon Communities Challenge. It is envisaged that this service could offer journeys for Bawdeswell residents, although routes and destinations have yet to be finalised.

<u>Transfer of Land at the Street (Folland Court)</u>: The Parish Council is still awaiting the transfer of this land from Flagship Housing and will continue to pursue the earlier agreement that the land is turfed before handover. While the Parish Council previously agreed that, once transferred, the land would be made into a small memorial garden, it will further discuss this option alongside the possibility of connecting such a garden to the celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

<u>HM The Queen's Jubilee in 2012:</u> Mrs Fel Roberts is keen to arrange a traditional tea party in the Street and has applied to Breckland Council for a grant of £100 towards the costs. Based on this information the Parish Council have agreed to support the event in principle and to set aside a provisional sum of £200 from the collective recycling efforts to help fund a Street Party. It was agreed that this event should be a non-fundraising 'free' social event for the whole village. All residents should have received a leaflet providing further information on this event and requesting residents to give feedback on whether they wanted such a party and whether they would help and/or attend. <u>Clerks Vacancy</u>: The Parish Council received formal notification from the Clerk on 16 Jan that she wished to give one month's notice to terminate her contract as Parish Clerk. She has, however, generously agreed to remain in post until a replacement is found. Should anyone require further information about applying for this vacancy please contact the current Clerk as soon as possible.

<u>Home Watch/Neighbourhood Watch Scheme:</u> Following the visit by our local PCSO at its December meeting, the Parish Council agreed to find a Homewatch Coordinator to re-introduce this scheme to the village. Subsequently, Mr B Cunliffe kindly agreed to take on this role, with Mr C Beane as his Deputy. However, as a result of Mr Cunliffe's further meeting with PCSO Jade Fuller to discuss implemention of the scheme, it would appear that a more localised system is required, with coordinators in each area of the village. While this approach might prove to be difficult for the village to organise, Mr Cunliffe agreed to continue his overall coordination role on Homewatch issues with the Council. Meanwhile, he will continue his efforts to set up the Homewatch Scheme for Reeves Close and Reepham Road residents. Anyone willing to become a Homewatch coordinator for their area of the village please contact the Clerk for more details.

Norfolk Warm & Well

A major public health initiative has just been launched in Norfolk aimed at helping reduce the detrimental effects that cold housing may have on vulnerable people.

There are four key areas of help available:

- 1. **Warm Packs** Containing "snuggle blankets", warm gloves, thermometers etc. to help people keep warm. *These will be free of charge*.
- 2. **Insulation** This is insulation other than loft or wall. For example radiator reflector panels, pipe lagging and graught proofing. This will be supplied and fitted by the Home Improvement Agency West Norfolk Care & Repair *at no cost*.
- 3. **Loan Heaters** Electric ceramic halogen heaters that can be loaned to households where their normal heating has failed due to boiler breakdown. There will be *no charge* for the loan.
- 4. **Emergency Oil Supply** These are containers of heating oil sufficient to provide several days supply in the event of the household being unable to secure delivery. The oil will *need to be paid for* and the containers will be recovered for reuse.

For the purposes of this scheme the following persons, living conditions or circumstances are deemed to qualify:

- Over 70s
- Frail
- Persons suffering from cardiovascular or respiratory/other illness
- Severe mental illness
- Dementia
- Learning difficulties
- Limited mobility or high risk of falls
- Young children
- Deprived circumstances
- Cold homes with mould growth
- Fuel Poverty
- Elderly persons living alone
- Marginalised groups



Projects at St Thomas' Foxley

We were busy lime washing the chancel in time for Christmas and also parts of the nave. It seemed to work well and was simple to apply. We will plan to tackle the nave and porch more when the weather gets warmer. Also we found and purchased new pinnacles to the tower which have been missing since 1986. They are really quite intricate and stand over one metre high. We are now exploring the way and costs of getting these re-erected. They are standing now at the base of the tower steps. I hope we can manage to get them re-erected this year, as it will put Foxley tower back on the map as a view point from the surrounding area. If you would like to donate anything to this project it would be greatly appreciated as scaffolding is extremely expensive.

We are also pursuing the Faculty approval for the bell restoration and the repair to the rotten 16th century floor under the bells. We are awaiting an English Heritage report and then can submit the Faculty. However, that only enables us to apply for a grant. (A Faculty is the equivalent of planning and building regulations for churches). We have been learning how to ring bells as a group so when we are successful the heritage can be re-established in the village in a sympathetic way. There have been 6 bells present in the tower since 1755 but they have only been rung 6 times in peals since 1901 due to their condition. So although we have been fund-raising and doing a lot of DIY work in the church to save money, any donations would be greatly appreciated in case we don't get the grant. If we don't get the grant we will have to make do and mend the bells to get them going and try again later. For example, the big tenor is cracked and has to be taken away for welding. If we don't do something it will be lost for ever if the crack gets much worse.

Doing this work keeps the church in good condition and that helps keep the village looking attractive. We are trying to do what we can afford in a step by step way, as well as making the church a more comfortable place to worship in. The church building has been there a long time- the tower was built in 1382 and the nave and chancel are much older. Retaining the medieval character and a sound building will leave a positive legacy for the next generation to appreciate.

It will be from 10.00am to 4.00pm. Visitors will be able to play the church's organ, and also two or three other small instruments to set up in the body of the church, and the organisers provide tea & coffee, and have a selection of organ music for sale.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

The riots in Greece have been worrying. Is this what happens when the resentment in a society boils over? The riots in this country last year were put down to disaffected youth. Could it get worse?

People in Greece have seen their living standards slashed in a way we don't understand in this country. Ordinary people have to cope with the "double whammy" of cuts in pay and higher taxes. It may well be that the situation they are in as a nation was caused by unrealistic habits and excess borrowing; and maybe individuals were to blame as well. But when our living standards are slashed, we experience it as a loss; not only do we have less to enjoy, we feel our own powerlessness, which can also cause resentment.

I remember when I was a languages student in the 1970s I went to stay with a family on a modest farm in West Germany. They had one really good portrait of a family member, and an exquisite chest of drawers in the sitting room, among some very ordinary furniture. The farmer's wife said to me: "We put those in the back of the car before they closed the border from East Germany, they were all we managed to take, and we were afraid that the border guards were going to take even them." She took the washing to two seventy year old spinster sisters in the village; "before the war their family had vast estates in Pomerania."

Sometimes the loss of lifestyle is so catastrophic, or has been going on for so long, that we just get on with life as best we can. How can I expect to consume the same resources in a world that will have twice as many people in it when I die as when I was born? Human inventiveness may cover some needs, but sometimes we just want more than we need.

The Christian season of Lent is a time of fasting. As a symbol, we do without one or two things. What would happen if you had to consider: what can I really not do without? Everything else is a gift, an extra.
