BOOK CLUB



Solar by Ian McEwan

Love it or hate it, this book certainly divided the group in a 60/40 split with those that enjoyed it in the minority. Michael Beard is a Noble prize winning physicist whose best work is behind him. A compulsive womaniser, Beard finds his fifth marriage is floundering. But this time it is different: his wife is having the affair and he feels he is still in love with her. The story thus unfolded into either raucous comedy or whimsical farce depending on which side of the 60/40 split one sat. However, as we have found in previous books the strong views generated in the book group members by an author's creation of complex and seriously flawed characters, certainly leads to interesting and varied discussion.

The book was reviewed by Anthony Quinn of the Mail on Sunday as 'the funniest book McEwan has ever written'. It continues the fine tradition of English drollery, pioneered by Kingsley Amis, in which the high ideals of the mind are constantly sabotaged by the low instincts of the body: the academic with his trousers down'. However, as in most things, it is a matter of perception. AB

<u>Code of Conduct</u>: Councillors approved the adoption of the code of conduct on complaints as suggested by Breckland .DB Proposed and NM seconded. It was also agreed that the code of conduct will be reviewed at the next AGM Meeting in May 2013.

<u>Declarations of Interest</u>: The Chairman and the Parish Clerk with item 6 living on either side of the proposed site but, have no financial interest. NM declared an interest on item 10 having put in a quote for the new roof.

MATTERS ARISING NOT COVERED ELSEWHERE ON AGENDA

<u>Highways</u>: Potholes are still a main problem in Foxley and surrounding roads. Old Fakenham Road, Chapel Road, Mill Road.

Resurfacing Old Fakenham Road and replacing all white lines on every junction. Clerk to contact Highways. The Street is still having problems with muck and mud on the road, with the rain problems we have had, it has been causing all sorts of problems with the drains. It is the responsibility of the farmer to clear the highway of any mud or waste materials either at the end of the working day or sooner if required. The farmer concerned seems reluctant to carry out this duty. Clerk to contact Highways, Environmental Health and County Councillor Bill Borrett.

Retirement Bungalows: It was agreed by all Councillors that the proposed site for two retirement bungalows would not be acceptable as they would be outside the Village guidelines, and could well lead to others with land adjoining applying. A legitimate need had to be established and there was the issue of access on a single track road, which was a Breckland objection to another application. They have been advised to wait until guidelines on Local Development Framework are reviewed again which may be later this year.

<u>Village Sign</u>: It was proposed by NH that Kelvin Thatcher undertake the work constructing a new sign for Foxley DB seconded.

This was after NH, who has been asking Foxley residents for help financing this good cause .The Clerk would like to thank everyone who has become involved.

<u>Finance</u>: Summary of accounts : The financial report was presented and signed.

Clerk's Expenses were agreed cheque no:100355 £31.50.

<u>Village Hall Roof</u>: Margaret Bryne represented the Village Hall Committee on the matter concerning the roof. The Committee have applied to Biffa Awards and also the lottery for funding and at this time have no more details available. Hopefully by the next meeting in October both the Committee and the Parish Council will be in a better position as to how the mechanism for financing the Village Hall Roof will be achieved.



BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MEETING HELD ON 3rd SEPTEMBER 2012

<u>Present:</u> Councillors Shannon, Kirby, Mallen, Mason, Mr G Bambridge (District Councillor), Mrs H Moore (Clerk) and seven parishioners.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

Allotments: No news to report. Outcome of the BALGA AGM is awaited to seal their endorsement of the pursuit of allotment provision. The offers from landowners remain as they were. Until there is further news, the item will be removed from the agenda.

<u>Possible Pedestrian Access to the Heath</u>: Councillor Kirby continues to pursue the possibility with the landowner.

<u>Folland Court</u>: The transfer is close to completion and work has begun on the Jubilee Garden. The wildflower bed and rose bed are ready for planting, the bench will soon be installed, and a blacksmith has been contacted to create a wrought iron rose arch with a Jubilee Theme. All costs so far are under budget.

<u>Possible Work on Churchyard Trees:</u> Ailsa McColville, although no longer a Councillor, is pursuing the potential work and has commissioned a tree surgeon to produce a report. <u>Condition of Common Lane:</u> The Clerk is still pursuing this with NCC Highways to seek clarification on the legal position regarding maintenance.

The Localism Act: Following a discussion and amendments to a draft produced by Councillor Shannon, the Council agreed unanimously to the finalised text, giving the Parish Council's perspective on Localism and possible future developments within the village. The text is included in this issue of Reeves Tale so that parishioners have the opportunity to comment upon it. Subject to those comments, it will then be used in future discussions with Breckland District Council on any future Local Development Framework.

Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

<u>Village Hall</u>: Three recent fundraising events had been a great success and raised a total of £2,600 towards the new Village Hall. The Council voiced its congratulations and thanks to all involved. The two recent grant applications for the new Hall had been turned down but feedback received will help the re-application process. The Hall Committee's Constitution was an issue and all Councillors agreed the amendments proposed by the Committee to resolve this issue.

Emergency Plan: Parishioner Dan Taylor has volunteered to be the Co-ordinator. He will now draft a plan with support of the Council and the Breckland Emergency Planning Officer. He is now in the process of producing a community-wide flyer seeking support for the plan. The Council agreed to produce and distribute this to every household in and around the village. The Council expressed a huge vote of thanks for Mr Taylor's generous offer to undertake this task.

<u>Bus Services</u>: It is clear that some improvement is needed in public transport between Bawdeswell and Dereham. The Clerk will press hard for a representative of the NCC Transport Department to attend a future Council meeting.

<u>The Village Green</u>: A submission from a group of parishioners was circulated and examined by all Councillors. The submission proposes that a group of specified volunteers take over the weed control of the footpath around the Village Green from NCC Highways. The decision was carried to accept the proposal, naming five parishioners as the volunteers.

PARISH COUNCILVIEWS ON LOCALISM - BAWDESWELL AND YOU!

The new Localism Act is already in force and, while many details regarding its impact on local communities needs to be established, it does, in principle, offer local communities far more empowerment in the provision and management of local facilities and the future development of the village. Local communities now have the right to challenge the policies and plans of higher authorities, and to develop their own plans through the use of referenda.

In terms of future development, the Localism Act, and its associated National Planning Framework, gives a presumption in favour of sustainable development in the absence of any local plan (such as Breckland's Local Development Framework).

While the Breckland LDF remains extant, it will be reviewed over the next year, and a new 'Local Plan' based more on the National Planning Framework will be formulated. Communities will be consulted during the drafting of this Local Plan, as we were on the LDF, but there is no guarantee that 'local' views will prevail.

The Localism Act does offer local communities the chance to formulate their own 'neighbourhood plan', as long as they accord with associated district, county and central government plans, and also receive a 50+% approval of the associated community through a referendum. Once agreed, such plans would have to be respected by higher authority and therefore carry considerable weight. However, while a neighbourhood plan for Bawdeswell would be an attractive way of ensuring that our views on the future development of the village are respected, such a plan would be beyond our financial reach.

Bawdeswell Parish Council therefore believes that we have no alternative but to embrace the Localism Act and take best advantage of its provisions when and if they are better defined. Moreover, on grounds of cost alone, the Parish Council should pursue its objectives for the village through the Breckland consultation process, rather than formulating a Bawdeswell neighbourhood plan. With this in mind, the Parish Council has agreed a formal position to take in such future discussions.

The Parish Council agreed that Bawdeswell's previous position within the Breckland LDF discussions i.e. opposing all but very minor housing development within its

settlement boundary, and accepting that there would be no associated infrastructure improvements, may no longer be sustainable within the new National Planning Framework; nor would it necessarily be the best thing for the village as a whole.

Accordingly, and taking into account the general views expressed by parishioners in the formulation of the earlier LDF, recent Project Bawdeswell surveys, planning consultations and earlier council meetings, the Parish Council has concluded that, while the village should not pursue or endorse any major housing development around Bawdeswell in isolation, it should be prepared to consider and possibly countenance some limited and sympathetic development if, and only if, it was irrevocably and directly associated with and accompanied by significant improvements in infrastructure and support/social/employment opportunities within the village. Bawdeswell Parish Council intends to pursue this line in any future discussions on the impact of the Localism Act on the future development of this village.

At the meeting in August, it was established that for legal reasons in future all decisions and actions to do with the New Village Hall had to be made by the Charity which is managed by the Village Hall Committee. Until now, Project Bawdeswell has been an 'enabler' but as it has no constitutional structure, it is not deemed suitable by grant givers for funding. There was some discussion on how to divide the activities of the two committees in future. Project Bawdeswell has developed the activities undertaken in the village and the Village Hall committee has been, and is responsible for, providing the facility. It was agreed that the following items would be transferred to the Village Hall committee to manage: (1) Lottery Grant Stage 1; (2) New Hall – Next Stage Approval; (3) New Hall Fund – update; (4) New Hall PR; (5) Fund Raising (Community) 2012/2013; (6) Time and Talent Investment (Community). Updates on these six items will be reported by a representative of the Village Hall committee in future editions of this magazine.

One other grant applications is currently being put together for submission. Again, progress on this will be given in future reports of the Village Hall committee meetings.

Bawdeswell was a 'runner up' two years ago in the 'Pride in Norfolk Awards'. It was agreed that we would apply under the 'Green Space' category this year.

The Committee agreed to now 'centre' its focus and activity on children and young people through the creation of facilities and activities which will also cover the play park/recreational ground, BAG and BAGY.

Legal Corner by Ruth Collings

I'm a solicitor and I specialise in Private Client work. This includes the preparation of wills as well as advising clients on probate matters (the process when someone dies). However, it also encompasses areas like powers of attorney, tax planning, applications to the Court of Protection, entitlement to NHS funding of care and many other subjects. In these monthly articles I'm hoping to shed a little more light on the work we do in my department and generally raise awareness of legal problems.

This is the first in a series of articles and, this month, I would like to mention one particular advantage in making a will. As you are probably aware, a will sets out who should inherit your assets when you die. In this way, making a will gives you the freedom to choose your beneficiaries, rather than letting the legal system decide for you.

In your will you can leave gifts of money or other personal items to your chosen friends, family or your favourite charities. These are known as legacies and they can range from the smallest item that may have some significant emotional importance for you - to a large financial gift that could change someone's life.

Having thought about legacies, the next step is to decide whom you would like to inherit the remainder of your assets (also known as your residuary estate). You can pass everything on to just one person or you can share it up as you desire. Often people divide their residuary estates up into percentages which can help create a fair balance between different family members, friends or charities.

Sometimes your loved ones can be in unusual or awkward financial positions that may affect your wish to hand money over to them. More on other aspects of wills and these unusual situations to come.



ALL SAINTS CHURCH BAWDESWELL

Disabled access to the church has been improved by the purchase of a portable Wheelchair/Scooter ramp. It is 7ft long and a lot less

steep than the previous wooden ramp. It is kept just inside the church door and can be set up on request.

The Friends of the Church have offered to help us pay for this.

Residents of Bawdeswell were surprised to hear the sound of church bells pealing melodiously on a Wednesday morning at the end of August. All Saints' church has only one bell which strikes the daytime hours and is tolled for services. The bells ringing that morning were a demonstration by the clockmaker Smith's of Derby of what can be done electronically using two small horn loudspeakers. It was clearly effective as a number of people came to see where the sound was coming from and had thought that they had heard real bells.

The funeral of Michael Nash was held in the church on Friday 7th September and he was buried in the churchyard extension on Norwich Road after the service. Michael lived in Blackhorse Close and was 68.

The service was conducted by the Revd Tom Candeland.

The North Elmham WI visited Bawdeswell in August and were appreciative of a short tour and talk about the church. Celia Joice added to the occasion with family memories of Bawdeswell going back to Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

The truth is a very valuable thing. But when do we want the truth to be known? Do we want to know it? Are we bothered?

"The truth must be told". The Hillsborough Inquiry and the Leveson Inquiry have brought to light wrongdoing by groups of people, against numbers of others. For so long, the cover-ups have been in place. The truth is justice. It is embarrassing to those involved in the cover-up, and the truth coming to light and being broadly known is a comfort to those who have felt unheard. Hearing *all* the evidence is important.

Exposing large-scale lies is in the public interest. However, there are truths that some don't want known, that are not in the public interest. Silly teenage pranks that get on to YouTube can haunt someone's life. Yes, they are the truth, but they are not the *whole* truth about a person. Public inquiries try to find out as much as possible, but gossip doesn't seek a rounded story.

It's like that with school. Pupils who only want to know enough to pass an exam are the despair of every true teacher. The search for answers or the truth, and excitement with a subject, are a vital part of the desire to learn. Curiosity is a really useful virtue in the fields of education and science. Getting a rounded view is being educated; getting information for exams is being crammed.

To paraphrase something the Chief Rabbi said recently, the search for God and the search for scientific knowledge are both the search for truth. They do not conflict. The most valuable truths are the ones we learn ourselves; the ones that make us *wiser*.

The more you do learn, the more able you are to fit lots of pieces of knowledge together. "The truth will set you free". How much do you want to find out, to learn? The way to stay mentally young and emotionally mature is to learn new things every day
