Unfortunately, as Alfred self-finances and works on this film, Alma finally loses patience with his roving eye and controlling habits with his actresses. 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BOOK CLUB - The Swan Thieves

This extra long book, the second by American author Elizabeth Kostova was our choice for June. At 600 pages it was quite a time consuming challenge if not a literary one! On the whole the group thought it could have been half the size; there were too many words that didn't progress the story, provide atmosphere or delight in any way. However, we all seemed to find something within it that spoke to us personally.

The main story was around the attempted destruction of a French Impressionist painting in a Washington Art Gallery and the motivation for it by the perpetrator. Allow me to tell you dear reader that he was tall, dark and handsome, an artist himself with a full-on creative temperament which sadly descended into obsession and for which eventually he was admitted to a mental hospital.

There he came under the charge of Marlow, a psychiatrist, reported to be able to make anyone talk, but who in treating this case turned amateur detective and sought out his patent's family, employer, mistress and travelled to France and Mexico in pursuit of the reason for the obsession, leaving him to his own devices. On top of that in the end the psychiatrist married the mistress!

The story is told by several characters and running through as a sort of motif is the translated correspondence of two French Impressionist painters of the 1870/80s, one a 25 year old married woman, the other her husband's uncle. Their delicately portrayed growing love for each other as well as their mutual love of art is the best read in the book and obviously there is the knowledge that this must have something to do with the current story – the letters often mirrored the main story at certain points and at the end we do learn that the consequences of their love affair led to the motivation for the destruction of the painting.

The themes of the novel are interesting - art and artists, the creative spirit and how destructive it can be to the artist him/hersel f, to their families and the different choices made by a female artist in 1880 and the mentally ill obsessive male artist of today. On the whole it was a bit of a 'pot boiler' but not without some merit. MM

A big thank you was recorded to Tony and Chris Hood for the donation of £288.00 to the New Hall Fund from the profits of the Tractor Day. It was a very successful day with 37 tractors leaving from and returning to the VH and in all 60 breakfasts were served.

The next big event is the Festival weekend - 12-14 July with approximately 20 gardens open. and a Heritage Exhibition at the VH, all in support of the New Hall Fund. Programmes will be available at the Hall to allow entry to all gardens and refreshments will also be available there. It should be a great weekend with something for everyone. PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS BAWDESWELL ANNUAL PARISH MEETING: 21 MAY 2013

At the recent Annual Parish Meeting in the Village Hall, I gave a short account on the work of the Parish Council and associated groups over the last year.

Your Parish Council is comprised of six unpaid volunteers doing what we hope is the bidding of the village. We are technically elected, but in recent years there have never been enough volunteers to make a contestand we are one councillor short. If anyone is interested in doing that little bit more for their community, please contact the Parish Clerk, Helen Moore. The next parish council elections are due in May 2015.

Your Parish Council is comprised of a few (6) largely unsung and unpaid volunteers doing what we hope is the bidding of the village. We are technically elected, but in recent years there have never been enough volunteers to make a contest! In fact, with the resignation of Ailsa McColville last year, we remain one councillor short. So, if anyone is interested in doing that little bit more for their community, please contact the Parish Clerk, Helen Moore. The next parish council elections are due in May 2015 – so please help make a contest of it.

The Council has had a typical year, with some good and some bad news to impart.

On a positive note, and with considerable help and effort of a merry band of slaves too numerous to mention individually, we managed to finalise work on the Folland Court Jubilee Garden and Adam's Pit, although I note that the latter has been vandalised on a fairly frequent basis – more of which in a moment!

We will need to tidy up both these and other venues and streets around the village in preparation for the Festival in mid-July, but most of the major work was completed on schedule, on budget and, seemingly, to the satisfaction of most.

We have, however, made little or no progress on the allotment issue – the land that was offered for purchase as allotments proved to be poorly sited and too expensive!

Thanks and congratulations mustgo to Peter and Carolyn Good for their sterling efforts in taking care of the village sign and associated green – it always looks a picture and is a great credit to the village. Other successes include the recruitment of Dan Taylor as Coordinator for our embryonic village emergency plan. Dan has done a great job researching and drafting up the plan, which is aimed at protecting the village and its inhabitants in the event of any localised emergency – bad weather, power cuts etc. However, such a plan is only as good as its participants. Your help is therefore needed, in particular to act as area wardens helping to coordinate local activity and keeping a weather eye out for the more vulnerable folk in your area. This is not the officious Dad's Army style of warden – more of a friendly soul looking out for others in the neighbourhood, and the role sits very well with the helpers needed for the neighbourhood watch system set up by Bill Cunliffe. So, if you feel you can help, please let us know. While talking of Bill Cunliffe, I would also like to extend the thanks of the community to him and Jackie for masterminding, marketing and running the new FAB (Fifty and Beyond) Group within the village. It has been a great success so far and bodes well for the future.

Turning from the older to the younger element of the village; Karen Green has thankfully stepped into the shoes of Janet and David Cockburn to take on the valuable work of the Bawdeswell Activity Group. Our sincere thanks must go to David and Janet for setting up the group and ensuring its success in recent years.

Rounding off the successes, our Community Car Service is going from strength to strength in terms of customers and service, but with success comes increased costs to the village as a whole, and the Coordinator, Angela Shannon, would not let me in the house if I did not advertise our continuing and pressing need for more drivers.

And now the bad news:

First, the all-important money issue! As some have already remarked, this year's Precept showed a dramatic 30+% increase over last year, but given the relatively small size of the budget (£15,000) it doesn't take much to show such a rise in percentage terms.

Yes, there have been increases all round (that's inflation for you!), but most of the increase was not, as some think, the Parish Council spending your money on ill-founded and unnecessary projects; it was mainly down to security measures in and around the Village Hall as recommended by Norfolk Police in response to the recent spate of anti-social behaviour. There is more we need to do to meet all of the Police recommendations, but for the moment we cannot afford it. So, contrary to some opinions, the Precept increase was NOT down to proposals for footpaths and community orchards. Concerning the latter, let me just stress that the Parish Council has not taken any final decisions. Yes, we have agreed in principle to both ideas, but much will depend on the business plans being brought forward and, in particular, the longer term maintenance costs of such projects.

Village surveys within Project Bawdeswell have always shown a desire to improve safe access from the village to Bawdeswell Heath, particularly for children. We cannot do much about the A1067, but the Council does believe that a footpath down Dereham Road would also significantly improve road safety for residents down that dangerous road. Moreover, support for the scheme is probably best expressed by the willingness of Dereham Road residents to fund the parish council 25% share of any capital costs for such a footpath (with the NCC funding the rest). That said, the PC cannot take any sensible decision until we see the associated NCC Highways view later this month.

The Council approach to the community orchard idea is similar. We clearly want to make best use of the land that the Recreation Ground offers, and the eastern end is only used occasionally. However, the PC recognises the concerns expressed about possibly losing what recreational space there is. Moreover, we must ensure that such proposals fit in with the longer term plans for the whole area when we have a new village hall. That is why the Council has sought advice from the Village Hall Committee, as well as a better defined business plan from the proposers before taking any decision on the project.

On the failure front, and despite our best efforts, the PC seems to be no nearer persuading NCC and associated bus companies to extend their services from Dereham to Bawdeswell and other surrounding villages. NCC argues that there is no proof of a viable market, given that not many

people use the existing sparse and mainly weekly shopper buses, which in our opinion are badly advertised. The PC response is that we have proven demand for a regular daily bus service to Dereham in the result of the recent village survey, and that one can never prove the viability of such a service without giving it a fair trial. We haven't given up, and now hope to get a joint initiative together with other surrounding villages with similar needs, but don't hold your breath!

Other problem areas we are facing mainly surround the increasing incidents of anti-social behaviour in and around the village. As many of you will know, we have experienced pure vandalism and criminal damage in the setting of fires on the Recreation Ground, litter and the digging up of others' good work at Adam's Pit, obscene graffition the kiddies' play equipment, break-ins at the Village Hall and in the sports lock-up, as well as alleged drug dealing around the village. Frankly, none of this is befitting a small community such as ours! The problem is further exacerbated by the fact that a number of the alleged offenders are not from Bawdeswell, but the village does seems to have become a centre for their activities! With the summer holidays approaching, I am somewhat fearful about what to expect.

The question is what can we do about it?

In the shorter term, perhaps the only answer is to: remain vigilant, not take action into your own hands, but report all incidents of anti-social behaviour to the Police using the 101 number. When you do, please remember to ask for an incident number to ensure the incident is logged.

This approach did result in us getting some priority policing earlier in the year, but the absence of sufficient 101 calls recently has meant that we are no longer considered a priority. We hope to change that at the Community Action Group meeting in Dereham towards the end of this month. We are also writing to the Police seeking better feedback to our calls. But, I repeat, we will get nowhere unless we use the 101 system to ensure the Police know of our problems.

In the longer term, we recognise there is little in the village for the older youths to do which is both interesting and cost effective for them.

Fel Robertshad some very good ideas, concentrating on trying to give youngsters a sense of worth, confidence and responsibility within the community, and to engender more harmony between young and old. However, Fel, after many years of giving her heart and soul into the community, has rightly decided that family and livelihood must come first. She will be sadly missed, but Alex Kirby has kindly agreed to step into Fel's shoes, large (metaphorically) as they were, to take Project Bawdeswell forward.

In closing, let me also add my thanks to all the other stalwarts of the village, many of whom are here this evening. You are too numerous to mention individually, but you know who you are – you are the generous few who give freely of their time to make this village a better place to be.

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 3rd JUNE 2013 AT 7.30pm IN THE PORTACABIN

Present: Councillors: Mason WM (Chairing the meeting), Kirby AK, Lilwall JL, Mallen JM, Bambridge GB (District Councillor), 2x PCSOs, and Mrs H Moore (Clerk) + 1 parishioner.

Ongoing issues from previous meetings:

Anti Social Behaviour: PCSO Charli Stone reported that there had been one crime reported in the past month. Instances of anti social behaviour are still not being reported. It is imperative that any occurrences are reported as any piece of information could fill a gap that is missing and help police greatly. The PCSOs are regularly patrolling the village and keeping records of youths that they meet. It appears that Bawdeswell is a meeting point for youths aged between 15-19 from surrounding villages and as far as Fakenham.

Folland Court: A copy of the Land Transfer for Folland Court has been received and the Solicitor is now pursuing land registration.

Other business of interest to parishioners:

Recycling credit received for glass in 2012-13 & play area. AK is the new Chair of Project Bawdeswell. PB's aim currently is to provide a shelter, outdoor gym equipment and repair the swings on the play area. It was clarified that PB is an enabler for such projects, under PC approval, acting with delegated authority. It was decided that the recycling money be used for PB towards these aims with the PC approving PB seeking repair of the swings. Any funding applications for equipment and the shelter will be brought before the PC. JM will liaise with AK regarding funding applications, on behalf of the Village Hall Committee.

<u>Litter pick up - to discuss litter pick up & road sweep ahead of the Village Festival on 12/7/13</u>: It was decided that it would be a good idea to organise a litter pick up ahead of the festival. The Clerk will liaise with DS in seeking volunteers and arranging this. The Clerk will request the BDC carry out a road sweep and that NCC carry out a litter pick up along the main road and by pass.

Village Hall Committee news

The AGM was held recently and the minutes have been circulated to the Council. Hall users have appointed two members to the Village Hall Committee (Jane Bown and David Cockburn). At the AGM the Chairman gave his report and as part of that issued David Cockburn with a voucher as thanks for his hard work and commitment to the hall. At the end of the financial year unrestricted funds held were £4,552 and restricted funds were £4,902 - WM noted that the restricted funds now include the received grant for £7,000 from BDC towards architects costs, making them around £12,000. The Cinema Club is viable and continuing well. Election of 6 members to the management committee took place. These are Alan Collier, Carolyn Good, John Mallen, John Menzies, Marietta Menzies and Dave Roberts. It was noted with regret that Fel Roberts had resigned due to time constraints. A huge vote of thanks was given to her for all her hard work over the years. Two parish council appointments were made being James Lilwall and William Mason. At the Village Hall Committee meeting James Lilwall was elected as Chairman, Dave Roberts as Vice Chair, Marietta Menzies as Secretary, William Mason as Treasurer, Les Beach as Caretaker and John Mallen as Bookings Clerk, News is still awaited from the Charity Commission regarding the new constitution. The Business Plan for the new hall is being updated which is key to the stage 3 of the Lottery bid. An aspestos survey at the cost of £295+VAT is being carried out on the hall and a bat and bird survey quote is being sought. The chippings for the car park are being looked at as to how and when they will be laid/spread. £650 was raised over the past year from a percentage of hall bookings being allocated to the new hall. Thanks go to Tony and Chris Hood for organising the recent tractor rally which raised £288, also towards the new hall. A new policy is being looked at regarding storage in the village hall as much is being left for long periods of time. There has been lots of communication with the Lottery regarding Stage 2 of the application which is encouraging. Other avenues of funding are being looked at including Biffa and the Norfolk Community Foundation. Upcoming fundraising opportunities include the Village Festival and the Open Gardens. Publicity includes Radio Norfolk and the EDP.

Next meeting will be Monday 1st July at 7.30pm in the Village Hall Portacabin - all are very welcome.



All Saints Church, Bawdeswell

As summer is reluctantly appearing, our thoughts are turning to the Bawdeswell Festival, marking 700 years during which we know that we have had a Rector in Bawdeswell. The surviving past Rectors or their families have been invited.

Last month I referred to Bishop Graham's address to the assembled church wardens at Aylsham. The final part of his message was the need to tell today's generation about God and Jesus so that the church will continue after we are gone. This is why we seek to have ministers in every town and village to care for the local people when they need the church and to preach the gospel in each locality. Providing a rector or vicar for each parish costs a lot of money each year and the congregations in the Diocese of Norwich contribute about £6million each year, a huge amount when you think about it. But we have not kept pace with rising costs and the Diocese is having to spend its limited reserves. In order to try to make clearer the costs involved, each benefice (in our case, the six parishes of Foxley, Lyng, Elsing, Bawdeswell, Bylaugh and Sparham) will be asked to contribute the amount that the Diocese has to pay to provide us with a rector, plus a share of the wider costs such as training and support for church schools. This will mean a considerable increase from what we have paid in recent years – at least 15% a year for the next few years. A church without ministers is just a building – if we want to have a rector for our villages, the responsibility is ours to make sure the funds are there to support him or her.

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LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Everybody, hello again.

This summer in the summer club for primary age children we'll have the topic: "If God made the world, why aren't we robots?"

It would have been so much simpler if everybody were programmed, and did what they were told. We wouldn't have to think. We might malfunction, we might wear out, but we wouldn't have to take responsibility for anything. We could be made to be good. And so could our fellow human beings, which might be much more interesting to us. Other people behaving properly is often more important to us than behaving properly ourselves.....

But in a way we are already robots. Quite a number of us are walking around with metal joints or pacemakers; our bodies are machines that we treat as an engineering problem, just as much as organic beings. We fuel them, we fix them if we can.

And we are robots in that there are forces that control us. Day to day decisions are taken our behalf by governments. Computer engines discover our preferences, and target their advertising at us as individuals. Other people's decisions affect the patterns of our lives: a supermark et opens and fifteen small retailers close; a small group of bankers invent a scheme, and half the world is impoverished.

But then of course, we aren't robots really. We're reminded of that most frequently when we are on holiday. We stop being bound by routine; we have to make many more choices than we normally would in a day; we experiment with new experiences, go to different places. Maybe some of us will only look for what is advertised, and follow the crowd; but others of us want to discover things, feel our freedom.

The world is an odd, savage, delightful, beautiful place. We may be settled in one place, but our minds can roam in wonder. Do robots make choices? Do robots have a sense of wonder? I wonder....
