The Sapphires (PG)

1968 was the year that changed the world and for four young Aboriginal sisters from a remote mission this is the year that would change their lives forever. The sisters, Cynthia, Gail, Julie and Kay are discovered by Dave, a talent scout with a kind heart, very little rhythm but a great knowledge of soul music. Billed as Australia's answer to 'The Supremes'. Dave secures the sisters their first true gig and flies them to Vietnam to sing for the American troops. A genuinely NICE film with a good 'message'.

Saturday 8th June 7pm

Lincoln (12A)

Epic and reverential bio-pic from Steven Spielberg with a central performance by Daniel Day Lewis that sweeps all before it. Important also to mention Sally Field as Lincoln's wife and the meticulous work that has gone into recreating 19th century Washington DC. Better received in the USA than over here but still a good piece of film-making from Spielberg who has generally avoided the clichés and produced a compelling portrait of a complicated man.

Saturday 6th* July 7pm

Hitchcock (12A)

In 1959, Alfred Hitchcock and his wife, Alma Revill, are at the top of their creative game as filmmakers amid suggestions from some critics about it being time to retire. To recapture his youth's artistic daring, Alfred decides his next film will adapt the lurid horror novel, Psycho, over everyone's misgivings. Unfortunately, as Alfred self-finances and works on this film, Alma finally loses patience with his roving eye and controlling habits with his actresses. Anthony Hopkins as Hitchcock and Helen Mirren as Alma.

Saturday 10th August 7pm

Hyde Park On The Hudson (12A)

Bill Murray as FDR, the estimable Laura Linney as Daisy. Olivia Williams as the formidable Eleanor Roosevelt, Samuel West as King George V1 and Olivia Colman as Queen Elizabeth. This is a cast to die for and a fascinating film, made in the actual locations where the events took place. In the mid 30s, Daisy Stuckley ran into her sixth cousin (then the famed US President) and they fell in love and apparently had an idyllic relationship. Then the King and Queen of England come to stay at the President's Hudson Valley house during their famous visit to the USA in Spring 1939 and everything falls apart.

Disappointed of Dereham Road

I have just read this month's Reeves Tale and as usual, very interesting reading it makes. We read this Parish Magazine avidly each month just to see how the new mover and shakers in the village want to "improve" our village. Normally, I would rant and rave about something or other and then, as a good Brit, do nothing about it. I am sorry, but the time has now come to make some sort of statement and if I may, through your publication, try to create some debate into what I believe the silent

majority want within our village. Where should I start I ask myself? There seem to be so many issues that require debate.

Let us first discuss our Parish Council - there are at the very least 3 issues up for debate.

Please allow me some preamble at this point. Back in the 1980's the then Parish Council spent some considerable time and effort acquiring some land in the village for a recreation ground and possible village hall relocation. Its main premise was to secure an area within the parish that would be available for sporting and recreational use. The current location was not perfect but was the best solution at the time. As time goes on, other villagers take up the cause and what was founded 30 years ago, hopefully, continues to improve.

Issue 1 – Heritage Orchard

A proposal to convert a part of the village playing field into some sort of heritage orchard, that when established, would be a place for villagers to sit in the shade and picnic, (I assume with the required wicker basket, straw boaters, parasols and pink gins).

To read the actual proposal was hilarious, thank you to the Reeves Tale for including it in the magazine. Because of this I now know the proposal has come from the "Incredible Edible Bawdeswell Group", an organisation that tends approximately 50 sq. ft. of "garden" and 10 sq. ft. of "arable" land that delivers possibly a handful of runner beans and perhaps a beetroot or two, if only to help their recipe book.

Their Opportunity No.9 was the most amusing. This coming from the same source that would like the Parish church to become, I quote "The Bawdeswell Central Community Hall".

Items up for discussion. These are just three of many.

- 1: Who is going to maintain trees and the surrounding area? The PC's contract with a company to cut the grass probably costs circa £700pa. What would be required to maintain an orchard?
- 2: Who decides how the "harvest" is shared? Is it to be by sealed tender to the PC or a free-for-all as the anarchists of this world would like?
- 3: If I haven't chortled enough I find under "Further and future opportunities" that they (Incredible Edible Bawdeswell Group), believe there is a need for raised beds on the playing field site for the benefit of elderly/disabled parishioners. Do they really think that they would struggle down to the playing field to tend a raised bed only to find at harvest time it has been either purchased by the highest bidder, or just taken after all it would belong to the community?

On a positive note if the "Incredible Edible Bawdeswell Group/close down the Church and Lets have Central community Hall" group would really like a community orchard, why not put it in the Churchyard. It will reduce maintenance costs for the Parish Council and eventually when the harvest is gathered a decision can then be made as to whether it be an ecumenical or a secular share out.

Issue 2 - Footpaths

I note that the PC has plans to provide footpaths to Bawdeswell Heath. Does the PC really think that the village really cares whether there's a footpath or not? As an observer of the "hordes of walkers" from the village that make the trek to the Heath risking life and limb, at the most ten/month, of which half already live on the Dereham Road, is it justified to spend £2,300 of Parish money? Please don't get me wrong. Yes, the roads to the heath can be hazardous for pedestrians but then so are the majority of rural roads in the county. Do we want everywhere to have footpaths? Maybe we should go the whole hog and have separate cycleways as well. Is there really a need for this expenditure at this or indeed any time? Is this one of the reasons that the parish precept has increased this year alone by over 32%?!

Issue 3 – Work on the Churchyard

My understanding was that the PCC could not afford to maintain the churchyard and had handed the responsibility of the closed churchyard to the PC. It wasn't the PC who wanted the extra expenditure or the responsibility. The law states that the PCC can just "give up" any responsibility for closed burial yards and pass that responsibility on to either the Parish or, if they refuse, the District Council. So why is the PC even discussing with the PCC what work they intend to do on the site? PC - it is your responsibility - do what you need to do and if the Church has a problem, then let them deal with the consequences of their earlier decision.

Lastly, I understand that the Book Club has been reading Lady Chatterley's Lover by D H Lawrence. Is this the reason there are no Forget me Nots left within the parish?

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Travels With My Aunt Graham Greene

Henry Pulling is an unmarried retired bank manager whose life revolves around growing dahlias. One can almost picture him ambling down to the newsagents each morning to collect his *Daily Mail*. Suddenly, at his mother's funeral, he meets his long-lost relative: Aunt Augusta. She is a formidable character, (think Margaret Rutherford). Hereafter, Pulling's drab life is transformed in a series of incredible journeys. Aunt Augusta, it quickly becomes apparent, is anything other than a beacon of moral certitude. The hapless Pulling finds himself entangled with hippies, drug dealers, fixers, police officers and an outrageous cast of Aunt Augusta's lovers.

From the start the book is highly entertaining and often very funny. Here's a scene that establishes the mood of the book:

Aunt Augusta and Pulling are flying to Paris. Aunt insists they travel first class because one makes up the difference in fares with the free drinks:

"The more reason for you to hurry, young man."

BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 8th APRIL 2013, at 7.30pm, IN THE PORTACABIN

Present: Councillors: Shannon DS (Chairman), Mason WM (Vice Chairman), Beane CB, Kirby AK, Lilwall JL, Mallen JM, Mr G Bambridge (District Councillor) and Mrs H Moore (Clerk)+ 3 parishioners.

Ongoing Issues from Previous Meetings

<u>Possible Pedestrian Access to Bawdeswell Heath</u>: The bids have now been submitted to NCC and a decision should be received by the second or third week of May. AK had posted a note regarding donation requests in the Reeves Tale and so far this has resulted in two positive responses.

A counter-proposal received re Community Orchard 'to leave the area vacant for a possible more appropriate use later': DS noted that in its March meeting the PC had agreed in principle to the proposal for a community orchard, subject to further detail and advice being received from the Village Hall Committee and the original proposers on siting and the business plan. JL informed the meeting that the Village Hall Committee had recently noted that the proposal for fruit trees may not fit in with the new hall landscaping scheme. The PC concluded that the concerns raised in this counter-proposal would be taken into account in subsequent discussion by the Village Hall Committee and Parish Council regarding the desirability and future cost and maintenance of an orchard.

<u>Folland Court</u>: Sincere thanks were expressed to JM for his sterling work in resolving the incorrect plan used in the land transfer for the Folland Court Jubilee Garden. The Solicitor is now pushing ahead to finalise this with Flagship Housing and there will be no cost to the PC.

<u>Common Lane</u>: The Highways Engineer would like to be kept informed of water lying in areas on Common Lane – AK will forward photographs of problem areas to the Clerk.

<u>Bus Services</u>: NCC Transport had updated the Clerk to say that it was not looking likely that any bus service enhancements would be forthcoming, albeit NCC will advertise the existence and timetable for the weekly shopping buses to Dereham. The Clerk was asked to reply to NCC, copied to Councillor Borrett, expressing the PC's disappointment and hope that there might still be a way forward bearing in mind that other nearby villages were pursuing the same issue. The Clerk was also asked to write to surrounding villages (Billingford, Lyng, Sparham, Elsing, Foxley and Bylaugh) to assess whether or not joint action on the issue could be pursued.

<u>Paradise Road Sewers</u>: Anglian Water reported that a CCTV Survey had been carried out on Paradise Road and work to repair the problem is to be completed by 29th April 2013.

<u>Possible work on Churchyard trees</u>: It had been established that some of the trees needing work in the Churchyard have Tree Protection Orders. All necessary

information had been passed to BDC to apply to work on these and other trees in the Churchyard and a response is awaited.

Other Business of Interest to Parishioners

Village Hall Committee News: New lighting had been installed to the car park and outside of the village hall, and this has met with positive feedback from users of the hall. There was an incident this week involving an attempted break into the BAG cupboard but nothing had been stolen. All key holders are being reminded to be vigilant. The rates for hiring the hall are to be simplified but regrettably increased in some areas to reflect the running costs of the Hall. The agreed 40 tonnes of road planings have been delivered but were deemed insufficient for the temporary repair of the car park; hence a further 40 tonnes had been requested but these are not currently available. The New Hall Open Meeting held recently was well attended. A good presentation had been given by the architects and useful feedback received at the meeting. The Stage 2 Lottery application is now in and a response is expected within 3 months. JL gave thanks to the sub-committee involved for all their hard work, Project recording has now started using photographs to illustrate events such as the open meeting and progress. The new constitution is almost ready to go to the Charity Commission. MP George Freeman is visiting on 28th June as part of PR for the new hall.

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The Cold Winter Lingers... Chris Bell



Growing up in Texas, where March generally means getting the shorts and t-shirts out, has made March in Norfolk my least favourite month weather-wise, as the cold weather often-times lingers into what is generally accepted the first month of meteorological Spring. This is, in part, due to the cold North Sea

temperatures, which I discussed in last month's summary are much colder than average off of the Norfolk coast at the moment. In fact, there were a few buoys off of the coast that reported water temperatures less than 3C during the month.

March 2013 did nothing to improve my attitude towards the month weather-wise, as temperatures by day were 4C below the long-term average. The average high temperature during March 2013 was only 5.9C, with temperatures reaching less than 4C on 8 out of the 31 days. There were two particular "cold-spells", the first between the 9th and the 14th, with the coldest night recorded on the 11th into the 12th (-2.6C). The second, of longer duration, lasting from the 20th through the end of the month as winds stayed northeasterly during that entire period. This gave a bitterly cold windchill factor at times as temperatures generally ranged only between -1C and 5C by day and night. Air frosts (temperatures below 0C) were recorded on 18 of the 31 days. The mildest day came on the 5th with a high temperature reaching 13.8C in a brisk southwesterly wind.

It was also a wetter than average month with 64.4mm of precipitation recorded (average for March is about 44mm). About one-third of the month's precipitation fell on one day (the 9th), ahead of a cold front that changed the rain to snow during the evening of the 9th before clearing. Snow laid on 10 days including a spell between the 9th and 15th.

Overall it was a cold, wet month, but signs of Spring will soon allow us to forget the Winter of 2012-13.

Wensum Valley Birdwatching Society

Indoor Meeting

David Sadler joined us to speak about 'Songbird Migration'. What a fascinating subject, and he only introduced us to the bare bones of it. Why do birds migrate? Food plays a central part. In the UK the cooling of temperatures in autumn means that active insect life decreases so warblers and others need to move south to more insect rich environments. As spring here approaches, food supply regenerates with insects etc again becoming plentiful so birds can return to their traditional breeding grounds. The hazards are plentiful: raptors already with young looking for food; hunters in the Mediterranean; weather. Some birds travel huge distances without stopping whilst others need to refuel on the way. How do we know where birds travel? Ringing is helpful but dependent on a bird being re-captured or found, probably dead. Now we have geolocators so small and light that they can be fitted to the smallest birds. Some send information via satellite, others need to be recovered for the information to be downloaded. Historically our spring/summer birds were thought to do strange things in the winter: Redstarts were thought to change into Robins, Swallows thought to hide down in the mud of ponds. Radar changed our ideas as birds could be seen moving in flocks on the screen. So gradually more and more information enables us to know where birds go, what route they take (not necessarily the obvious one to us), distances travelled and how long it takes. As I said, a fascinating subject.

The Brecks was the destination for our outdoor meeting. What a great area this is. We started at Santon Downham and were rewarded for our early start with a singing Wood Lark showing very well in a close tree. A Kingfisher flew past quickly down the river and two Grey Wagtails disappeared when our party approached. We were looking for Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, a scarcity these days, but had to enjoy Siskin, Lesser Redpoll, Nuthatch and various others instead. A move to Lynford Arboretum followed and there indeed did we find our Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, two in fact along with Greater Spotteds. Plenty of Nuthatches again, Marsh Tits, a Goldcrest and others were seen, but the wind was very cold. A move towards the Lake rewarded us with Little Egret, Shelduck, Gadwall and others with many Buzzards gracing the sky. The end of the day was nigh but we just had time to visit the open Breckland area to find our first Stone Curlew of the year. Despite the cold wind this was a very successful day.

Our next indoor meeting is on Thursday 16 May at 7.30pm at Weston Longville Hall for All. Next outdoor meetings are Saturday 4 May at Bayfield, Sunday 26 May at Sparham Pools early for the Dawn Chorus and 20 June Marsham Heath for Nightjars. Keep Calm & Chop Logs!



Norfolk Wood Warm - Community Woodfuel Club

For all those who use logs on their fires and stoves during the winter we have a new community interest company to provide wood fuel on a not-for-profit basis.

Norfolk Wood Warm CIC

How does it work?

Woodfuel is obtained in bulk, seasoned and processed, mainly by volunteers, and supplied in convenient breathable bags which can be moved on a sack barrow and stored until the logs are needed. Norfolk Wood Warm checks the weight and moisture content and works out how much energy is contained in each bag of logs and customers pay a price per kWh unit.

What do we need?

We are looking for local people to come along to help to split, stack, barrow and bag the logs ready for delivery or collection.

We are also looking for an enthusiastic person, or small team, to co-ordinate the activities of the group.

People who contribute their time and energy receive a small discount on the cost of logs.

What's involved?

A few hours of fairly physical work, on a weekend, five or six times a year. There are a variety of jobs suitable for all abilities from chain-sawing (for qualified people), splitting, filling wheelbarrows, stacking logs into bags, moving bags on sack barrows. If you are strong enough to pick up a log there will be something you can do to help.

- We will provide: axes, mauls, barrows, bags, tea, coffee and biscuits.
- You provide: stout shoes, gloves, packed lunch (if you can stay all day).
- You will get: fresh air, exercise, community spirit, local news and a supply of good quality winter logs for the minimum cost. (Volunteers receive a discount).

Sessions run from 10.30am to 4pm at our site just outside Reepham.

There will be a first meeting at 10.30am on Saturday 25th May 2013 at Whitwell Station Tea House, Reepham. We will have an initial chat about the club followed by some hearty splitting and bagging of logs. If you would like to come along please let us know.

Legal Corner

Power of Attorney part II

In my last article I wrote about certain types of powers of attorney. However, the powers of attorney that are often most useful are the ones that keep working for you if you lose mental capacity.

In the 1980s Enduring Powers of Attorney (EPAs) were introduced, so that attorneys could help people with their finances both while the donor (the one giving the power of attorney) has mental capacity and in circumstances where the donor loses capacity.

EPAs were quite straightforward to create. Most EPAs are only three or four pages long and are effective as soon as they're signed, witnessed and dated by the donor and the attorney(s).

However, we can now no longer create EPAs. The document that has succeeded to the EPA in October 2007 is the Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA). LPAs function in much the same way as EPAs in that a donor can give authority to attorneys to make decisions on their behalf. However there is a significantly more complicated procedure to set them up. In the new procedure there are various safeguards for the donor and I will go into more detail about those in a later article.

Both EPAs and LPAs now come under the umbrella of the Mental Capacity Act 2005. Guidance about the interpretation of the Act can be found in the Code of Practice which is attached to it. Both the legislation and the Code of Practice can be found online. If you know of any attorneys who are uncertain of their role and want some guidance, they may like to first of all take a look at these two documents. More information can also be found at https://www.gov.uk/power-of-attorney

Enduring Powers of Attorney authorise attorneys to make decisions about your property and financial affairs – in effect they can get involved in any decisions that have a financial impact. There is now a specific LPA that covers the same area. However, one of the innovations in the changes that took place in 2007 is a Lasting Power of Attorney covering decisions about health and welfare issues. If you know someone who has an EPA, they may also wish to consider making an LPA covering health and welfare issues because before October 2007 there was no way to give someone else this type of authority.

From the Rector

Dear Everybody, hello again.

A saying that has stuck with me through my adult life is "Every time you sling a bit of mud, you lose a bit of ground". The poster I saw it on made the point firmly by having a drawing of a man standing on a small island in the sea, pulling bits off the edge to throw.

I feel the same about the current brouhaha over playing the song "Ding, dong, the witch is dead," on the BBC. An internet campaign by various people who thought it would be funny to mark the death of Margaret Thatcher this way has taken off. There are three ways in which those who have been involved in this campaign have diminished themselves.

First, in this country we have a convention that you respect the dead; and certainly, that you respect mourners. The most obvious way that the jokers have belittled themselves is in looking spiteful. Margaret Thatcher is dead, and won't know what's going on; her family will.

Secondly, anyone who has seen "The Wizard of Oz" will know that the song is sung by powerless munchkins. It's one thing to use Margaret Thatcher's death as an occasion to protest against the outcome of her policies; that's political discourse. But to put yourself in the role of someone who could do nothing about it is to cast yourself as a victim. And every time you cast yourself as a helpless victim, you lose some of your determination to work and fight for what is right.

Third, and much more subtly, the use of the term "witch" is almost invariably sexist. No man – unless he really is involved in pagan practices – is called a witch. "Witch" is what (mostly) men call women with their own power and authority, as if in the normal run of things, women have no right to strength. It's difficult to think of a similar term out of the nursery that would be applied to David Cameron by those who find his policies divisive or repellent.

Three reminders for those involved: to respect the dead, respect themselves, and respect women. And for us all, a time to recall how long grief lasts, and how much there is to honour in those we have lost.
