BIG LOTTERY – BIG GRANT FOR BAWDESWELL

The Bawdeswell Village Hall Charity is delighted to announce that it has been granted £500,000 from the *Big Lottery Reaching Communities Buildings* programme to support community activities in Bawdeswell by building a new village hall.

Receiving this grant means the Charity can develop its plans for improvements and build a new village hall which will give indoor space for new varied and exciting activities. There are many users of the recreation field which is a wonderful outdoor space, and the new hall will complement it, giving a "complete package" for social and sporting events. The new hall will offer space for different activities to happen simultaneously, encouraging the community to come together regularly. Exercise, indoor sports and large events will take place in the main hall. There will be two small rooms flexible enough for a variety of groups and activities.

Also, there will be a well equipped kitchen suitable to cater for large functions and a large social area ideal for sports people to congregate in before and after their games. Young families will be able to meet in this area which will have a large window overlooking the children's play area giving the opportunity to keep an eye on the youngsters.

The committee is very excited about receiving this grant but in the cold light of day knows there is still a funding gap to be met in order to build the dream building. $\pounds 500,000$ is a huge award. It is as if the Lottery has given $\pounds 588$ on behalf of each household towards the project. But part of the deal is that we put funds in as well. We need to find a further $\pounds 60,000$. Some people have said they will help once they know that the Big Lottery has come on board. Big Lottery has said **yes**, so now it's our turn.

We have to meet all grant and planning conditions. These include protecting our environment. We have sought the costly advice of specialist ecologists in order to meet all necessary requirements and carried out their recommendations: In order that birds cannot begin to nest in the trees that are within the building footprint and under the eaves of the existing building, the trees have been felled now before nesting starts, and the eaves have been netted.

Demolition and construction will begin as soon as possible. There are legal, funding and of course building decisions to be made before work can commence but it is expected to be from 3 - 6 months before we have a start date.

All current hall users will be contacted about alternative venues during the construction period.

We urge the whole community to become part of this project by signing up for more bricks, making a donation, or by undertaking a fund raising event, anything that can help close the funding gap so that the project is completed as planned.


Any Human Heart – by William Boyd.

Any Human Heart tells the story of Logan Mountstuart 's long and rackety life, one which spans every decade of the twentieth century, in all its fantastic and humdrum, dangerous and tranquil, tragic and humorous aspects.

This is a compelling, pacy, witty, sexy and clever story that becomes a brilliant and innovative charting of the 20^{th} Century. Logan has the habit of popping up, Forest Gump like, at pivotal moments in the 20^{th} century and teetering on the brink of immortality before, inevitably, plunging back into obscurity. Logan's journey touches on key moments and movements that still shape our times in the 21^{st} century: the prewar emergence of the working class power and the end of establishment complacency; the rise of European Fascism; the last global conflict that was WW2; the zenith of American hegemony in the 1950s and 60s; the emergence of political terrorism; the squalor and degradation of urban poverty and finally the serenity and wisdom that a long, fully lived life can provide.

Somewhat unusually, this book met with almost universal approval from the book group. Although Logan's behaviour through 2 marriages, numerous affairs, one tragic true love, sexual scandal in the New York art scene and destitution in Pimlico did not meet with universal approval, the complexity and variety of these adventures certainly generated a good deal of interest and discussion.

The Book Club meets in the Workhouse Bar on the first Thursday of every month at 8pm. We mostly obtain books from the Library so there is not the expense of buying new books each month. We are currently reading <u>Espedair Street</u> by Iain Banks for discussion at our meeting on 3rd April 2014 and plan to read <u>The Night Circus</u> by Aaron Morganstern for discussion at our meeting on 1st May 2014. BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL DIGEST OF MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 3RD MARCH 2014 AT 7.30pm IN THE PORTACABIN

Present: Councillors: Shannon DS (Chair), Mason WM (Vice Chair), Beane CB, Kirby AK, Lilwall JL, Mallen JM, Bambridge GB (District Councillor) and Mrs H Moore (Clerk), 3

Mallen JM, Bambridge GB (District Councillor) and Mrs H Moore (Clerk), 3 parishioners.

Ongoing issues from previous meetings:

Update on footways to the Heath: Work on both the Billingford Road and Dereham Road verge improvements has been carried out. The final outstanding touches will be carried out by the Highway Rangers. The surface will become more level once the weather becomes warmer and the areas are walked on more frequently. The condition of both areas will be monitored and should further work be required, this will be looked into.

Bus Services: Following the previous meeting, the Clerk wrote to Bill Borrett and the Transport Department regarding the PC's concern about the reduced service, the lack of consultation prior to the cuts in service, and our continuing request for a bus service to Dereham. No response has been received as yet. The Clerk will chase this.

Any other business of interest to Parishioners:

Local Government Boundary Commission - Electoral Review of Breckland draft recommendations: The draft recommendations suggest the area becoming a two member ward which would reach from Gateley to Hockering. This is a large rural area to cover and would potentially mean that the members would attend parishes less often. It was agreed that the Clerk will respond to state that the PC see no benefit from this as it will only be a disadvantage for rural areas having two district councillors looking after such a large area.

The parishes involved will suffer and not enjoy the same level of support as they currently do.

Dog bin on the Heath: Bawdeswell Heath Trust have put forward a request that the PC purchase a replacement dog bin for the Heath, as they have done previously. This would cost in the region of £100. It was agreed that the Clerk go ahead and purchase the new bin, on the understanding that the Trust arrange to install and insure it.

Recreation Ground anti social behaviour: DS reported that there was an instance of serious anti social behaviour at the recreation ground on Saturday 1st March. A group of youths lit a fire in the corner of the basketball court. It was reported to police who are treating it as criminal damage - arson, and are seeking the culprits. The clerk will seek an estimate to repair the asphalt and an insurance claim will need to be made.

Village Hall and Project Bawdeswell

To discuss any items relating to the Village Hall and/or Project Bawdeswell: JL noted that the Lottery Team had a positive visit in February. The announcement on Stage 3 of the application is due by 18th March. All agreed that the VHC go ahead with seeking someone to carry out removal of the three conifer trees, before birds begin to nest. Costs will be met for this by the VHC. It was agreed that the Clerk and WM liaise to commence the loan application for £50k towards the new hall costs. This will be carried out on the understanding that future precepts will not include maintenance for the village hall and its environs. DS noted that once the Stage 3 lottery decision is known, representatives of the PC and VHC will need to meet to discuss the new hall project including costs and likelihood of the PC needing to apply for the second loan.

AK circulated the latest Project Bawdeswell minutes. There is to be a summer club again this year which will hopefully cover maths and english. Work needed on the recreation ground is now scheduled.

Finance

To agree the precept requirements for 2014/15, following on from discussions at the December/ January meetings: Breckland Council have now decided to issue the council tax support grant to all parishes. This will be for the same value as this current year, £1100.57. All agreed to accept the grant in addition to the precept for 2014/15 of £17,500.

Planning

Decisions - None. Applications - None.

Reports of dog fouling have been received regarding the area between Two Fields Way and Paradise Road, and also on the recreation ground.

A person in charge of a dog must remove the faeces straight away if the dog has defecated in an area where the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 applies. Otherwise they are contravening the Law and could be subject, on conviction, to a penalty of up to $\pounds1000$.





A Circular walk (6 miles approx 2 hours)

The fine Spring weather brings into mind all the lovely walks in this area. We will soon be able to enjoy a circular walk to Bawdeswell Heath, but not just yet as the new pathway is still a bit muddy.

Here is one that you can start in Bawdeswell or Foxley. It goes via Themelthorpe and round the far side of Foxley Wood to Jordan Green and back along Common Lane, the Roman Road.

Highlights: Quiet Lanes & Public Footpaths, St Thomas' medieval church and moated site of Foxley Manor (private land). Foxley Wood (*bluebells in May*). Fine rural views. Former Roman road. Bawdeswell and its unique church.

Head for Foxley past the school and along the pavement past the Old Rectory on your left. Keep on this side of the by-pass and turn right into Chapel Lane just past Floranova glasshouses.

At the end of Chapel Lane turn right down the Street and St Thomas Church is immediately on your left.

The lower part of the *Nave* walls date from the late Saxon or early Norman times. The *Tower* was built about 1380 and contains a fine ring of 6 bells.

Inside, the *pews* illustrate the social gradations of a former age, with six box pews for the farmers and their families.

On reaching Themelthorpe take the first road to your right at the Give Way sign. Turn right again when you come to the next junction and enjoy the peaceful countryside views as you stroll towards the Reepham Road.

On reaching the busy Bawdeswell/Reepham Road cross over carefully and head down towards Jordan's Green Farm. There are fine views to the right towards Bawdeswell. There is quite a deep valley down there. Shortly after the farm is a large red brick house on the right. A Public Footpath sign points down a lane just past here.

At the end of the lane follow the rutted track on the left of the farm buildings and head downhill on the nearside of the hedgerow towards the bottom of the valley. The grass verge to the field marks the Public Footpath and is signposted.

The path passes an interesting copse on the right. If you peer into the woods, you can see the sunken remains of the old Roman Road, now rather waterlogged and overgrown. The footpath continues past this and turns right over a footbridge into the next field, before it turns left again and crosses the stream at the bottom of the valley on another bridge.

Now you are on the Roman Road that leads up the hill to Bawdeswell.

It ran from *Durobrivae* near Peterborough, across the Fen Causeway from Flag Fen to Denver, followed Fincham Drove and crossed Peddar's Way between Castle Acre and Swaffham, thence towards North Elmham and Billingford, to Bawdeswell and Jordans Green, and on to *Smallburgh*.

St. Thomas', Foxley

At the PCC's meeting on 27 February, it was reported that the Bishop of Norwich has suspended the presentation of a new Rector to the

FLEBBS benefice, following the resignation of the Revd. David Head to take up his new appointment as Rector of Runton and three other parishes outside Sheringham. The Bishop will appoint a Priest-in-Charge instead in due course.

At a meeting of the Benefice churchwardens with the Archdeacon, [it was explained that the purpose of the suspension is to permit the Bishop to rearrange the parishes within the locality to accommodate] it was explained that the suspension was being made while a wider review of the pattern of ministry was being undertaken to accommodate the expected reduction in the number of full-time clergy.

This is partly because an unusually high number are due to retire in the next 10 years, and partly because at present the Diocese cannot afford replacements in every case.

The Archdeacon was very clear that a new incumbent for the FLEBBS benefice was to be appointed but as priest in charge until the review was completed. The Archdeacon confirmed that, if the churchwardens wished, the post would be advertised nationally, and that the applicants would be interviewed by parish representatives before an appointment is made, in the same manner as if the Patrons of the livings were presenting their nominees as in previous years.

All Saints, Bawdeswell

We are now well into the season of Lent, preparing for the great festival of Easter. We look forward to welcoming you to our services of Easter Vigil and first communion on Easter Eve (19th April) at 21:00 and our Easter GiG on Easter Day (20th April) at 10:30. The Easter Vigil starts later

than usual because Easter is very late this year and it will not be dark until 9 o'clock. In the service we see the light of the risen Christ breaking out of the darkness. Some churches keep the vigil all night but our service lasts only a bit over an hour.

Other services are continuing during the interregnum (the period between rectors). We are being supported by local retired clergy and we take many of our services ourselves. The March GiG saw a pancake race in the aisle as we thought about Shrove Tuesday and the beginning of Lent.

The process for appointing a new priest for the FLEBBS benefice is well under way and we will soon be advertising the post. There will then be interviews and, if a suitable candidate has been found, an appointment taking effect towards the end of the year. In the meantime, the churchwardens are the main point of contact. *William Mason, Churchwarden*



A letter from The Bishop of Lynn

I am glad to respond to a request to write a piece for the April issue of this parish magazine. It is the first full month of your

vacancy, which we will endeavour to keep as short as possible. Inevitably however, it still is likely to last well into the Autumn. Legally, the churchwardens, together with the Rural Dean, have responsibility during the Vacancy, however both the Archdeacon (who of course lives amongst you!) and I are available for any queries they are unsure of. I look forward to joining you for a Benefice wide service on July 6^{th} at 10.30 am in Foxley church.

Across the Church of England, a number of dioceses have recently made quite significant reductions in the number of their paid stipendiary clergy. There are a number of reasons, but the chief of them is an anticipated overall reduction in the number of available priests below retirement age. Nationally, it is expected that 40% of our current full time priests are expected to retire within the next 5 - 10 years. Although vocations are holding reasonably well at present, they are not holding up to that level.

In this diocese though we are seeking to hold the level pretty close to where it is. Four years ago our Synod decided to reduce by 15 posts over a 5 year period. We have not got there yet, but we are not planning to increase that level of reduction. Nonetheless, because we have not got there yet, the Archdeacon and I are asking deaneries in this Archdeaconry to reconsider their assessment of the appropriate organisation of benefices. We would like to achieve a long-term blue print plan across the whole Area.

We do not want to make sweeping changes because we believe that the church's presence in our communities is the most faithful way of reflecting God's commitment to us, his people. Later this month, we remember again the cost to him of that commitment in the self-denying gift of himself to his world in his Son, Jesus Christ. His suffering and death demonstrate the depth of his Father's commitment, and his Resurrection renews our hope that all will be well because of God's power to transform all things and bring about his perfect will for us. May it be so for you this Easter as we wait for a new Incumbent here. May it be so for David too, who will be missing you despite the excitement of coming to terms with his new set of responsibilities, and to whom we remain deeply grateful even as we anticipate this next stage of life and ministry here in this Group of Parishes.

Happy Easter on behalf of all my colleagues in the Diocese!
