BOOK CLUB

Espedair Street - Iain Banks.

This 4th novel by Iain Banks is focussed on the life of a rock star - Daniel Weir. It is a rags to riches story told in a series of flashbacks as he looks back on his life. Despite rising from the slums of Glasgow to find fame and fortune as a song writer and bassist, he is not a happy man.

What or rather who he always sought in life has always eluded him, his friends all seem to be dead or fed up with him and so he tries to commit suicide.

There are some comical moments such as the antics of his two friends. An alcoholic Marxist, and a young man who gets arrested after stealing whipped cream aerosols. Banks gives interesting insights on the nature of fame and the music business and gives you an idea of what it might have been like to be in a supergroup of the early 80's.

This book was not enthusiastically received by many members of the Book Club, with only one or two finding Daniel Weir amusing or thoughtful. The majority thought it was slow in parts and found the ending disappointing; it was perhaps too neat, too happy.

One member who has read other Iain Banks novels suggested that "The Crow Road" was a much better read.



BAWDESWELL PARISH COUNCIL

At its December meeting, the parish council agreed a draft policy statement on future development in the village (below). It also agreed to seek comments on the draft by publishing it in *The Reeve's Tale* for everyone to read. Please send any comments you may have to the parish clerk. There will also be an opportunity to discuss any matters relating to the village at the **annual parish meeting on Tuesday 20th May 2014 at 6.30pm in the village hall**.

Bawdeswell PC Approach to Possible Village Development in any Future Breckland Local Development Framework

General Policy

Taking into account general views expressed by parishioners in the formulation of the previous Breckland LDF, Project Bawdeswell surveys, recent planning consultations and council meetings, Bawdeswell Parish Council has concluded that, while the village should not pursue or endorse any major housing development in or around Bawdeswell in isolation, it should be prepared to consider and possibly countenance some limited and sympathetic development if, and only if, it was irrevocably and directly associated with significant improvements in infrastructure and support/social/employment opportunities within the village. Parish Council representatives will shortly be required to pursue this policy within the consultations on a future Breckland Local Development Framework (LDF), which in line with government policy is likely to seek sustainable development opportunities in villages such as Bawdeswell. This paper therefore seeks to flesh out this general policy in preparation for those consultations.

Detailed Approach

Rather than react to alternative proposals put forward by Breckland District Council and local landowners, Bawdeswell Parish Council is minded to propose the possible freeing up of some adjacent land outside of its current Settlement Boundary for sympathetic and sustainable development aimed solely at improving the quality of life for Bawdeswell residents.

The village is not lacking in small private housing development opportunities, but it remains short of affordable housing for younger families, those on lower incomes and sheltered accommodation for elderly residents. Moreover, while Bawdeswell hosts a number of small businesses run from purpose-built premises or from homes, it lacks local employment opportunities. The village is also short of local infrastructure to sustain major housing or business development. Bus services North/South to adjacent towns and medical facilities are poor, broadband/mobile phone communications are limited, the local school is currently full to capacity, and drainage/sewerage is poor in the Paradise Road/Two Fields Way area.

That said, the position of Bawdeswell some 12 miles equidistant between Norwich and Fakenham and 6 miles North of Dereham, with the major A1067 east/west route running alongside would seem to make it an ideal location for some sympathetic light industrial/retail development if existing infrastructure problems could be resolved.

Such developments, coupled with associated lower cost housing, would provide a much needed boost to the vitality of the community, and would offer potential support for expanding local infrastructure and recreational facilities.

Potential Development Sites

A number of potential development sites, proposed by associated landowners, we reconsidered and discounted by Breckland District Council in the development of its current LDF. The main objections were on the grounds that: many would comprise garden in-fill contrary to Breckland's and Bawdeswell Parish Council's current policy, and many lacked scope for safe access. The Parish Council remains in agreement with Breckland's conclusions regarding these sites. However, it believes that two possible sites are now worthy of more detailed consideration. These comprise the field opposite Two Fields Way, and the land within the Conservation Area opposite the end of the Street and to the East of Reepham Road.

Taking each of these sites in turn:

-The field opposite Two Fields Way has been considered for development on a number of occasions and, to date has been refused, largely on the grounds of the number of houses proposed, ribboning effects, poor drainage/sewerage in the area, and road safety concerns about access to and from the site via Hall Road. These concerns might be overcome by a more sympathetic development of the area than that previously proposed e.g. limiting the number and type of houses proposed; redesigning the local drainage/sewerage system, and by connecting Two Fields Way/Hall Road with Paradise Road with safer junctions at either end. If confined to housing, however, such a development would create an 'imbalance in the village, the so-called 'ribboning' effect. This might be alleviated to some extent by the creation of some social/recreational facilities within the area, but the site as a whole would better lend itself to the development of light industrial or retail facilities which, subject to NCC Highways' opinion, might warrant a safe direct access on to the A1067. The site would also lend itself to possible garden allotments which Bawdeswell is seeking.

-The land within the Conservation Area to the East of the Street would be ideal for some sympathetic development aimed primarily at relieving the current congestion in the Street adjacent to the shop and pub. This would require some re-arrangement of the current junction of the Street with Norwich/Reepham Road to permit safer access and free movement in the area, but it would be important for the village to retain its 'village green'. Moreover, bearing in mind the location of the site within the Conservation Area, close to the heart of the village, with an open vista to the East, it would be essential that any such development would be in keeping with the area concerned and not spoil the 'open' nature of the Conservation Area. Such development should therefore be limited, perhaps confined to some sympathetic lower cost or preferably sheltered housing and retail facilities.

Conclusion

Subject to any refinement of the above approach resulting from consultations with the village, Bawdeswell Parish Council will follow the above line in its future consultations with Breckland District Council. Depending upon the extent of support for the approach to be taken, the Parish Council might also approach the landowners concerned to sound out the scope and any appropriate quid pro quo for the development of the sites as outlined above. This might also include an invitation to these landowners to fund the development of an associated neighbourhood plan for Bawdeswell if they wished to firm up such ideas.


DO YOU NEED A VENUE ?

Local Church News

During Lent we have been able to welcome both the Archdeacon and the Rural Dean to preside and preach at Benefice Eucharists at Bawdeswell. It was good to see about 40 people in the congregation on each occasion. The Archdeacon of Lynn, The Venerable John Ashe, came as part of his four-yearly visitation to the benefice. The Archdeacon visits each benefice to see how the parishes are progressing, to check that everything is being kept in good order and to give an opportunity to discuss issues raised by the benefice. On this occasion, we discussed the vacancy and the review of benefice and deanery boundaries which had recently been initiated.

The Rural Dean of Sparham, The Reverend Tim Dean, came as part of his role during a vacancy. Tim has been a great help in finding clergy to take services while we are without a rector. He is now doubly busy because the Foulsham benefice will also be vacant when The Revd Veronica Wilson moves to Heacham.

The vacancy for an incumbent of the FLEBBS benefice will be advertised in the Church Times and on the Diocesan website during May with interviews likely to be in June.

As mentioned above, a review of benefice boundaries is in progress and all PCC members in the Sparham Deanery have been invited to a conference to discuss possible changes and adjustments on 24th May. The intention of the review is to try to work out the best pattern of ministry to sustain and enhance the mission of the church within the Norwich Diocese for the next twenty years or so. It sounds like process which will take quite a time.

WHY BELIEVE IN GOD? - AND GO TO CHURCH

(From The Reeve's Tale, April 2003)

Christians believe in God and go to church because they believe they have been called and attracted by Christ. They also have many human needs which they hope the church will meet.

In 1998 a school in Chula Vista set a homework assignment for its 3rd grade students. Here is the edited response of one pupil, Danny Dutton, then aged 8 years, to the topic: "EXPLAIN GOD".

It provides much to provoke thought and discussion on the nature and purpose of the church and our communal and personal relationship with God. I hope you may give time to read Danny's simple yet profound words. They contain much of value.

Explain God – written by Danny Dutton (aged 8)

"One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes these to put in place of the ones that die, so that there will be enough people to take care of things here on earth. He doesn't make grownups – just babies. I think because they are smaller and easier to make.

Jesus is God's son. He used to do all the hard work, like walking on water and doing miracles and trying to teach people about God who didn't want to learn. They finally got tired of Jesus preaching to them and they crucified him. But he was good and kind like his Father, and he told his Father that they didn't know what they were doing and to forgive them. God said OK.

His Dad (God) appreciated everything he had done and all his work on earth, so he told him he didn't have to go out on the road any more. He could stay in heaven. So he did, and now he helps his Dad out by listening to prayers and seeing which things are important to God to take care of and which things he can take care of himself, without having to bother God. Like a secretary, only more important of course. You can pray at any time you want and they are sure to hear you because they got it worked out so one of them is on duty all the time. You should go to church because it makes God happy, and if there's anybody you want to make happy, it's God. Don't skip going to church to do something you think will be more fun. That's wrong! If you don't believe in God, you will be very lonely, because your parents can't go everywhere with you all the time.

It's good to know that God is around when you're scared of the dark or when you can't swim very well and you get thrown in real deep water by the big kids. I figure he put me here and can take me back any time he pleases. And that's why I believe in God".
